Regarding the Ariha Shah case, Misri said that we have been in discussions with the German government, all German authorities, their embassy in Delhi, the German government in Berlin, and all the agencies involved for quite some time. This case was a legal matter at one point, but we believe that ultimately it should be resolved keeping in mind the humanitarian issues involved. Vikram Misri said

that we cannot say that we understand the family's pain and difficulties because only they can understand them. We are fully aware of the situation, and we are trying our best to help them in every possible way. We are also trying to ensure that Baby Ariha is raised in an Indian environment as much as possible. Misri said that recently we have also made efforts for other things. I don't want to go into details about it right now, but I want to assure you all that we are committed to this issue with the German government at every stage, and PM Modi

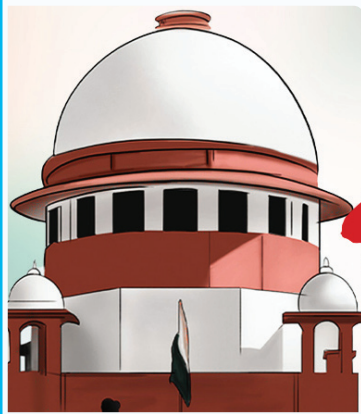

Supreme Court bench divided over Section 17A of the Prevention of Corruption Act, no decision reached

A lengthy debate on the anti-corruption law took place in the Supreme Court on Tuesday. During the proceedings, Justice BV Nagarathna emphasized the need to strike down Section 17A of the Prevention of Corruption Act. She stated that this section is unconstitutional and needs to be repealed. She argued that the requirement of obtaining prior sanction from the authorities in any corruption case protects corrupt officials and leads to delays in taking action against them. This situation is unacceptable. However, the bench hearing the case appeared divided. According to media reports, the other judge on the bench, Justice KV Viswanathan, said that Section 17A is necessary as it helps protect honest officers. Thus, the bench's decision was split.

Contract workers do not have equal rights as government employees: Supreme Court

New Delhi: The Supreme Court, in a significant legal ruling, has clarified that employees appointed on contract through an external agency or contractor cannot claim parity with regular employees of government departments or bodies. A bench of Justices Ahsanuddin Amanullah and Vipul M. Pancholi, in its judgment, declared government jobs as public property and stated that regular appointments are made through a transparent selection process, providing equal opportunities to all eligible candidates in the country. The court emphasized that there is a clear legal distinction between manpower hired on contract and those in the regular cadre. According to the bench, hiring through an agency or contractor is entirely at the discretion of the employer, while recruitment to government posts is governed by safeguards and procedures laid down under the Constitution. If this distinction between regular and contract employees is erased, the very foundation of different appointment methods such as permanent, contractual, and ad-hoc would lose its sanctity.

Despite Operation Sindoor, Pakistan hasn't mended its ways; terrorist camps have resumed operations across the border

Even after Operation Sindoor, launched after the terrorist attack in Pahalgal, Pakistan is not giving up its activities. Eight of the training camps destroyed near the LoC and the international border have become operational again, and it is suspected that 100 to 150 terrorists are present in them. Despite this, the Indian Army is fully vigilant and on high alert to control terrorist activities operating from across the border. Army Chief General Uppendra Dwivedi acknowledged this at the annual press conference at

The Army chief acknowledged that the army is on high alert to control terrorist activities operating from across the border



the Manekshaw Centre here on Tuesday. He emphatically stated that India is aware that six terrorist camps on the LoC and two on the international border have resumed operations. The army is keeping a close watch on them. Operation Sindoor was the best example of coordination among the three services under political direction and complete freedom to act or retaliate. Regarding the timing of the suspension of Operation Sindoor on May 10th after the conflict with Pakistan, Army Chief General Dwivedi said that as far as nuclear rhetoric is concerned, I would like to say that there was no discussion on nuclear issues in the DGMO talks, and whatever nuclear rhetoric occurred was by leaders or the local population of Pakistan. I did not receive any indication that anything of that sort came from the army. When we talk about our role in this, we eliminated approximately 100 of their (Pakistani) personnel.

Shaksgam Valley Dispute: Congress Questions BJP-Chinese Communist Party Meeting

A new political controversy has erupted in India over China's construction activities in the Shaksgam Valley. The Congress party has accused the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) of sending "mixed signals" to China and showing negligence in matters of national security. The controversy began after reports emerged of a meeting between senior BJP leaders and a delegation from the Chinese Communist Party (CCP) in Delhi. The Congress questioned the timing and nature of the meeting, calling



it a compromise of India's sovereignty. Congress leader Supriya Shrinete said that the alleged construction work by China in the Shaksgam Valley is a matter of serious concern. She tweeted that China has occupied the Shaksgam Valley in Jammu and Kashmir and is carrying out construction there under the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC).

She questioned how China managed to infiltrate this region after Ladakh. Shrinete described the meeting between BJP leaders and the CCP as "building villages in Arunachal and embracing in Delhi," and also accused the media of remaining silent on the issue. The BJP, however, confirmed the meeting, calling it part of inter-party dialogue.

In four years, the ED has taken major action in 3 states shortly before elections

Questions are being raised about the increasing activity of the Enforcement Directorate (ED) in West Bengal before the elections. The latest case involves raids on premises linked to I-PAC in Kolkata, bringing Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee and the ED face-to-face. Assembly elections are to be held in Bengal this year. Before this, in the last four years, similar incidents have occurred in three states – Jharkhand, Delhi, and Maharashtra – where the ED took major action in old cases shortly before elections. This year, assembly elections are to be held in



West Bengal, Tamil Nadu, Kerala, Assam, and Puducherry. The ED has started reopening files of old cases in these states as well. In Tamil Nadu, cases related to liquor, real estate, and shell companies have become a source of trouble for the ruling DMK. In Assam, where the BJP is in power, the fear of action against leaders associated with the opposition Congress and AIUDF is affecting the election funding network. In Kerala, the LDF government is embroiled in

gold smuggling and cooperative bank cases. In Puducherry, the agency is keeping a close watch on business and political alliances. It is worth noting that pressure mounted in Jharkhand after the arrest of CM Hemant Soren. In Delhi, Arvind Kejriwal's arrest cases disrupted the Aam Aadmi Party's (AAP) structure. In Maharashtra, cases related to Shiv Sena and NCP led to party splits and the fall of governments. Political equations changed several times even before the filing of charge sheets. However, the ED maintains that its work is solely to investigate under the law and has nothing to do with elections.

BJP has abandoned its "Nation First" ideology and become a party of goons and thieves first: Uddhav Thackeray

Mumbai: Shiv Sena (UBT) chief Uddhav Thackeray, taking a dig at the BJP, said that the party has abandoned its old "Nation First" ideology and adopted the slogan of "goons and thieves first." Thackeray accused the BJP of vitiating the atmosphere on linguistic and religious grounds. Addressing a joint rally with Maharashtra Navnirman Sena (MNS) chief Raj Thackeray in Thane, Uddhav said that the old BJP, which prioritized national interest, is dead. He emphasized that the next mayors of Mumbai and Thane will only be Maharashtrians. Targeting his rival and Deputy Chief Minister Eknath Shinde in his home constituency, Uddhav Thackeray said that the BJP will use and then discard Shinde.

Delhi Airport to remain closed for 6 days from January 21, thousands of passengers to face inconvenience

New Delhi: The fog has not yet cleared, and now air travelers at Delhi airport may face difficulties for another six days. Due to security protocols for Republic Day, the closure of airspace over Delhi from January 21 will cause further travel disruptions for passengers. According to media reports, the government issued a Notice to Airmen (NOTAM) on Tuesday for a six-day period starting January 21. According to the information, this 2-hour and 25-minute closure will affect thousands of flights and disrupt connections. This will lead to delays and cancellations for passengers and difficulties for airlines. This practice is for the annual dress rehearsal and parade for Republic Day.

Joint Briefing Held for Law and Order Management during Banka Mandar Festival–2026

Banka: A joint briefing of magistrates, police officers, and police personnel deployed for maintaining law and order during the Banka Mandar Festival – 2026 was held at the Bounsi Fair Ground. The briefing was chaired by District Magistrate Mr. Navdeep Shukla, IAS, Banka. Detailed guidelines were given in the meeting regarding security arrangements, crowd control, traffic management, and handling any unforeseen circumstances during the upcoming fair period. It is noteworthy that the Mandar Festival (Bounsi Fair) is being organized by the Tourism Department at the Bounsi Fair Ground from January 14 to 18, 2026. Considering the potential for a large crowd, a large number of magistrates, police officers, police personnel, lathi-wielding police, and women police personnel have been deployed to ensure that the fair is conducted in a peaceful, safe, and orderly environment. During the briefing, the District Magistrate clearly instructed all deployed officers to maintain constant vigilance in their respective areas and to take any kind of disturbance or undesirable activity seriously and sensitively, ensuring prompt action. Emphasis was also placed on strengthening the intelligence gathering system and taking



necessary steps from time to time. A warning of strict action was also given against officers who show laxity in the discharge of their duties. The Bounsi Fair will be formally inaugurated on January 14, 2026, at 3:15 PM. This year, two control rooms have been established for the fair. One control room will be operational in the fairground and the fair police station premises, and the other in the Papaharani Pond complex. Senior officers, police officers, police personnel, and a fire brigade team have been deployed in both control rooms to deal with any emergency situation immediately. The entire fair area has been divided into five mobile patrol teams, who have been instructed to patrol continuously and inform the fair control room of the situation every two hours. In addition, fifteen teams have been deployed for foot patrolling, who will regularly patrol their respective areas and inform the fair magistrate about the situation. To make

crowd control and surveillance more effective, CCTV cameras are being installed as needed at key locations such as main roads, crowded places, stages, and stalls, under the direction of the Sub-Divisional Officer, Banka and the Sub-Divisional Police Officer, Bounsi, enabling continuous monitoring from the control room. Special security arrangements have been made at the Papaharani pond and the Shri Shri 108 Lakshminarayan Temple complex, considering the possibility of devotees taking baths and performing religious rituals there. Keeping the depth of the pond in mind, clear markings indicating the water depth have been placed, and a team of divers, life jackets, and boats have been deployed to handle any emergency situation. This responsibility has been assigned to the Circle Officer, Bounsi and the Assistant District Disaster Management Officer, Banka. To ensure smooth traffic flow during the fair, the road from Papaharani to Mandar fair



is closed to all types of vehicles except administrative vehicles. The Maharana Hat intersection to Sabalpur-Vikrampur road via Papaharani has been made one-way, while the road from Papaharani to Bounsi fair will remain open for vehicles only up to Bansipur via Vikrampur. The fair route from Bounsi via Vikrampur intersection is completely closed. In addition, parking arrangements have been made at the Railway Ground, CND Sports Ground, near Kamdhenu Temple, in front of Mandar Vidyapeeth, Bounsi Forest Area main gate, Kaithatkar intersection, Art and Craft complex, near Bounsi Block office, and in Bansipur village ground, while a VIP parking area has been designated near the agricultural farm house. To make the traffic management even more effective, the Deputy Superintendent of Police, Traffic, has been given special responsibility. In addition, to prevent overloading, the Station House Officer of

Bausi, the Traffic In-charge, and the Motor Vehicle Inspector have been instructed to coordinate with each other and conduct intensive checks at the Bhaljor check post and drop gate to effectively control accidents and traffic congestion caused by overloaded vehicles. To reduce traffic pressure and ensure the safety of pedestrians, several routes have been declared as no-vehicle zones, where only pedestrian movement will be allowed with the installation of barriers and “no entry” signs. Furthermore, robust arrangements have been made for healthcare services during the Mandar Festival-2026. The Civil Surgeon, Banka, has deployed medical teams at both the district control room located at the Bausi fairground and the control room situated at the Papaharani pond complex during the fair period. Ambulances have also been deployed to handle emergency situations. A list of ambulance drivers’ names

and mobile numbers will be provided to the senior officer in charge of the control room, and this information will also be displayed on the windshields of the respective ambulances. To ensure the quality of food items sold at the food stalls during the fair, regular sampling and testing of food materials will be conducted to prevent the sale of any substandard or unhygienic items. To effectively handle any emergency situation during the Mandar Festival – 2026, comprehensive and robust arrangements have been made regarding fire safety, electricity, drinking water, and sanitation. A fully equipped fire brigade team, under the District Fire Officer, Banka, has been deployed at the fair control room and near the control room at Papaharani Pond from 9:00 AM on January 12, 2026, until the end of the fair. This team will be on standby to respond quickly to all types of emergencies and contingencies during the fair period to ensure the safety of life and property in case of fire or other disasters. To maintain a safe and uninterrupted power supply, the Executive Engineer, Electricity Supply Division, Banka, has been instructed to conduct a physical verification of the entire fair area and the Papaharani fair area, especially the Mandar Mountain region, before the start of the Mandar Festival. During the inspection,

any dilapidated wires, hanging wires, or weak electric poles found will be repaired immediately. It will also be ensured that there is no loss of life or property due to electric shock under any circumstances. Regarding the drinking water supply, the Executive Engineer, PHED, Barahat, has been instructed to conduct a site inspection of the entire fair area and the Papaharani fair area and take necessary action. The objective is to ensure that the general public and devotees do not face any inconvenience regarding clean drinking water during the fair period. Adequate numbers of temporary toilets are also being arranged as needed. The entire responsibility for sanitation arrangements in the Mandar Mountain area and Bansi Fair Ground (from Bansipur to Mahavir Chowk) has been entrusted to the Executive Officer, Nagar Panchayat, Bansi. The Nagar Panchayat will deploy a sufficient number of workers for continuous cleaning during the fair period and will ensure that no garbage is disposed of openly anywhere in the fair area. This work will be regularly monitored by the Executive Officer himself. The Block Coordinator, Lohia Swachh Bihar Abhiyan, Bausi, and the Block Development Officer, Bausi, also provided necessary support to the Nagar Panchayat as required.

National Road Safety Month – 2026: “Safety Through Education, Transformation Through Technology”

Sahibganj: Under the National Road Safety Month – 2026, a comprehensive awareness campaign on road safety is being conducted in Sahibganj district. 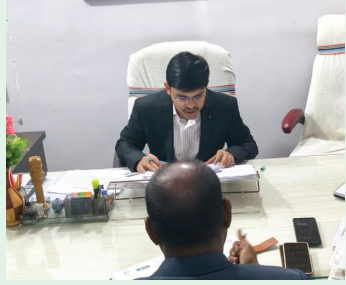

DDC reviews progress of various departments during visit to Sabour block

Bhagalpur: Deputy Development Commissioner (DDC) Mr. Pradeep Singh, IAS, visited Sabour block and conducted a detailed review of the progress of various departments at the block office. A comprehensive discussion was held on the current status of the implementation of government development and welfare schemes during the review meeting. The DDC emphasized the effective operation, timely execution, and quality assurance of the schemes. During the meeting, the work of various departments, including health, education, ICDS, agriculture, and rural development, was reviewed department-wise. The DDC obtained progress reports from the concerned officials and inquired



about the reasons for pending cases. He instructed all departments to work in coordination with each other so that the benefits of the schemes reach the general public smoothly. The review of the health department included a detailed discussion on primary health services, immunization programs, institutional deliveries, nutrition campaigns, and the availability of medicines. Under the education department, the review covered school enrollment, student attendance, teaching quality, the Mid-Day Meal Scheme, and the condition of school infrastructure. Special attention was also given to the functioning of Anganwadi centers and nutrition services under ICDS. During the review of the agriculture department, information was gathered on crop

The DDC instructed the officers not to show any negligence in work related to public interest. He said that the government’s priority is to ensure that the benefits of the schemes reach the last person in line, and all officers should take this seriously.

Makar Sankranti 2026: Classical Clarification on the Confusion Surrounding the Date — Pandit Nitesh Kumar Mishra

Godda: Confusion prevails among devotees across the country regarding Makar Sankranti 2026. Discussions are circulating about celebrating the festival on January 14th in some places and January 15th in others. Inaccurate calculations and incomplete information circulating on social media have left the general public confused. Makar Sankranti is a major solar festival of Sanatan Dharma, determined not by the lunar calendar but by the sun’s transit into a new zodiac sign. The actual and scripturally sanctioned moment of this festival is considered to be when the sun enters Capricorn from Sagittarius, marking the beginning of Uttarayana. Clarifying the situation based on the Mithila Panchang, Pandit Nitesh Kumar Mishra stated that in 2026, Makar Sankranti will be celebrated on Wednesday, January 14th. According to Pandit Nitesh Kumar Mishra, this date is considered completely scripturally valid in the Mithila Panchang and most authentic astrological calculations. Pandit Mishra explained that on January 14, 2026, the Sun God will enter Capricorn at 3:13 PM. Since the Sankranti period occurs during the day before sunset, performing bathing, charity, and meritorious deeds on the same



day is considered valid according to the scriptures. As Makar Sankranti is a purely solar festival, its timing is based solely on the movement of the sun. According to the Mithila Panchang, the Uttarayana period begins with Makar Sankranti, which is referred to as the path of the gods in the scriptures. Charity, bathing, and chanting performed during this period bestow inexhaustible merit. The scriptures clearly state: “Uttarayan is the path of the gods, Dakshinayana is the path of the ancestors.” Explaining the scriptural rules regarding the auspicious time of Sankranti, Pandit Nitesh Kumar Mishra said that in general Sankrantis, the auspicious period

is considered to be eight ghatas before and eight ghatas after the transit, while Makar Sankranti is considered special because it is an Ayan Sankranti (solstice). In this, the auspicious influence is accepted from forty ghatas (units of time) before, due to which the tradition of bathing and giving charity in the morning is considered in accordance with the scriptures. This year, a rare astrological conjunction is also forming on the day of Makar Sankranti. According to Pandit Mishra, Shatila Ekadashi also falls on this day, which is considered dedicated to Lord Vishnu. This combination of sun worship and devotion to Vishnu is described as extremely meritorious in the scriptures. The scriptures state: “In the month of Magha, when the sun enters Capricorn, the worship of Vishnu is especially auspicious.” Makar Sankranti is also a symbol of social harmony and goodwill. The use of sesame seeds and jaggery conveys the message of abandoning mutual bitterness and fostering sweet relationships, which is deeply ingrained in Indian folk tradition. Taking serious note of the matter, Dr. Nirmal Singh, a close associate of Kariya Munda, informed the police and the CMO about the entire incident on X (formerly Twitter). Dr. Nirmal Singh said on Tuesday that several WhatsApp calls were made to Kariya Munda's mobile number 9431108685 from mobile number 8208746581 on Monday, demanding money. The caller, identifying himself as a police officer, was threatening and demanding money. Kariya Munda, who has been unwell for some days, is facing considerable distress due to these calls. Dr. Nirmal Singh has demanded that the police take cognizance of the matter and take appropriate action. A case has been registered in this regard at the Cyber Police Station, Ranchi. The police are investigating the matter.

Temperature Fluctuations to Continue in Jharkhand Amidst Cold Wave

Temperature fluctuations will continue across the state amidst the ongoing cold wave. Several districts of the state are still experiencing a cold wave, while some areas are beginning to feel warmer during the day. The districts where a cold wave is expected in the coming days include the northwestern and central districts of the state on Tuesday, while on Wednesday and Thursday, a cold wave is likely in some parts of the central, northwestern, and southern districts of the state. The Meteorological Department issued a yellow alert for these districts on Tuesday. It is noteworthy that for the



past 10 days, most districts of the state have been experiencing a severe cold wave. The minimum temperature had dropped below five degrees in Gumla, Latchar, Lohardaga, Hazaribagh, and Ramgarh. However, the sun has

been quite warm for the past two or three days. Due to this, the minimum temperature has increased by two to three degrees. In the last 24 hours, the maximum temperature in the state was recorded at 28 degrees Celsius in Chaibasa and the lowest at 2.3 degrees Celsius in Gumla. Meanwhile, on Tuesday, the weather in Ranchi and surrounding areas was clear from the morning, but cold winds continued throughout the day. However, the sun felt quite warm. On Tuesday, the maximum and minimum temperatures recorded were: Ranchi 21.6 and 7.5 degrees Celsius, Jamshedpur 26.2 and 10 degrees, Daltonganj 25 and 5.6 degrees, Bokaro 23.1 and 7.1 degrees.

Murder over a land dispute in Khunti, seven criminals arrested

Ranchi: On the evening of January 7, 2026, Edel Sanga Padha Raja Soma Munda was shot dead by unknown assailants near the Jamuwadag pond under Khunti Police Station. In this regard, Khunti Police Station Case No. 03/26 dated January 8, 2026, under Sections 103(1)/61(2)/3(5) BNS 2023 and 27 Arms Act was registered. Considering the seriousness of the case, a Special Investigation Team (SIT) was formed under the direction of the Superintendent of Police, Khunti. Taking swift action, the team identified a total of seven (07) accused persons: (1) Baha Munda (2) Deva Pahan (3) Anish Munda alias Sukra (4) Raviya Pahan alias Ravi



(5) Rameshwar Sanga alias Ramesh, all from village Jiyarappa, (6) Pankaj Kumar Sharma alias Pandit from village Bikuwadag, all from Khunti district, and (7) Devbrat Nath Shahdeo, address: Palcot House, Kishore Ganj, Ranchi. Raids were conducted at the residences of all the accused. During interrogation, all the accused confessed to their involvement in the crime, and the mobile phones used in committing the crime were

recovered from them. All of them were then formally arrested. Upon questioning regarding the murder, the arrested accused Devbrat Nath Shahdeo stated that he had instructed the other local accused involved in the case to work on the disputed land in November-December of the previous year. The accused, under the pretext of building a football field, deliberately removed the previously erected boundary stones

during the leveling and construction work on the land, in order to illegally occupy the land. In protest, the villagers from the surrounding areas organized a village assembly under the leadership of Edel Sanga Padha Raja Soma Munda, and on January 3, 2026, they unanimously re-erected the stone monument at the same location. The accused were highly enraged by this incident and the actions of the Padha Raja, Soma Munda. Taking advantage of the opportunity, they murdered Padha Raja Soma Munda. Efforts are underway to identify and arrest the other accused involved in the crime, and continuous raids are being conducted for this purpose.

Blankets Distributed in Kotengsera Village of Torpa, Bringing Relief to the Needy

A blanket distribution program was organized on Tuesday in Kotengsera village of Torpa West Panchayat, under Torpa block of Khunti district. The program was organized by Block Chief Rohit Surin, during which warm blankets were distributed among the poor, helpless, and elderly needy people. On this occasion, Block Chief Rohit Surin said that his main objective is to provide assistance to the needy on a priority basis during the harsh winter season. He informed that these blankets will be distributed in all 16



panchayats of Torpa throughout the block office. This assistance will reach the needy people listed by the Panchayat Samiti members, Mukhiyas (village heads), and ward members.

Jharkhand State Bar Council Election: Questions Raised Over Security Deposit Amount

Strong opposition has emerged against the decision to set the security deposit for candidates in the Jharkhand State Bar Council elections at one lakh twenty-five thousand rupees. Calling it illogical, impractical, and against democratic values, senior advocate Sudhir Kumar Pappu, a resident of Jamshedpur, wrote a letter to the Chairman of the Bar Council of India and Rajya Sabha MP, Manan Kumar Mishra, on Tuesday. He also demanded intervention in this decision. The advocate stated that this exorbitant security deposit is an attempt to exclude economically weaker and underprivileged lawyers



from the electoral process. In the letter, the advocate clarified that such a high security deposit is not justified in poor and backward states like Jharkhand and Bihar. He mentioned that when the state government increased government fees by just five to ten rupees, lawyers across Jharkhand protested against

it, calling it an anti-poor decision. Therefore, setting a security deposit of one lakh twenty-five thousand rupees for the Bar Council elections is beyond the reach of ordinary advocates. Through the letter, he stated that the Supreme Court has set a minimum fee of less than one thousand rupees for the enrollment of new advocates, which clearly shows that judicial institutions value economic balance and the principle of equal opportunity. In contrast, this decision of the Jharkhand State Bar Council seems to be against the democratic spirit. Advocate Sudhir Kumar Pappu stated in the letter that the security deposit in the previous Jharkhand State Bar Council election was only ten thousand

rupees, which has been directly increased to one lakh twenty-five thousand rupees in the currently proposed election. He termed it unconstitutional, undemocratic, and arbitrary. He also questioned whether the Bar Council had held a general assembly and obtained the consent of its members before making this decision. He alleged that this decision, taken without the approval of the members, is illegal. Copies of this letter have also been sent to the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Chief Justice of the Jharkhand High Court, the Chief Minister of Jharkhand, the Advocate General of the state, and the Chairman of the Jharkhand State Bar Council for necessary action.

Section 17A of Prevention of Corruption Act: SC delivers split verdict; what the two judges said

New Delhi,Agency: The Supreme Court on Tuesday pronounced a split verdict on the constitutional validity of Section 17A of Prevention of Corruption Act that barred the agencies from probing corruption charges against government officials without the Centre's permission.

A bench of Justices KV Vishwanathan and BVNagarathna differed on the decision with the former judge observing that the said provision is constitutionally valid and the latter holding it as unconstitutional and should be struck down.

Justice Nagarathna said that no prior sanction should be needed from competent authority to prosecute a public official, claiming that the requirement of prior sanction is contrary to the object of the Act.

"Section 17A is unconstitutional and it ought to be struck down. No prior

approval is required to be taken. This provision is an attempt to resurrect what has been earlier struck down in Vineet Narain and Subramanian Swamy judgments. The requirement of prior sanction is contrary to the object of the Act, and it forecloses inquiry and protects the corrupt rather than seeking to protect the honest and those with integrity who really do not require any protection," Justice Nagarathna observed as quoted by Live Law.

She added that corruption in the country is rampant and pervasive and there is a need to have strong anti-corruption law, claiming that section 17A of Prevention of Corruption Act protects a corrupt official.

Meanwhile, Justice K V Viswanathan said that the provision is valid but Lokpal/Lokayuta should decide whether a govt official should be prosecuted or not.



he added that striking down Section 17A would amount to "throwing the baby out with the bathwater".

"Section 17A is constitutionally valid subject to the condition that the sanction must be decided by the Lok Pal or the Lok Ayukta of the State," Justice Viswanathan observed.

He added that unless honest and public servants are shielded from frivolous investigations, a "policy paralysis" will set in.

He also emphasised that a fine balance has to be maintained between the need to protect a public servant from mala fide cases and the importance of upholding probity in public offices.

He in his opinion reasoned that object of Section 17A was not to condone illegal acts but to have a screening mechanism.

"Bhagvad Geeta says for a self-respecting man even

death is more preferable than disrepute. In this age of technology and social media the act of parading in court etc. is irreversible even if proven innocent later", the judge said.

The bench thus, ordered referring the matter to the Chief Justice of India. We direct the Registry to refer the matter to the Chief Justice of India to constitute an appropriate bench to hear the matter afresh

This comes after 'Centre for Public Interest Litigation' filed a plea in the apex court, claiming that introduction of Section 17A in PC Act was nothing but resurrection of the earlier Section 6A of Delhi Special Police Establishment Act, infamously known as 'single directive' which mandated the CBI to take the Centre's sanction before probing joint secretary and above level officers.

Advocate Prashant

Bhushan, representing CPIL, had contended that Section 17A had become a tool to shield corrupt officials and obstruct legitimate inquiries.

What the law says

According to the Section 17A of the act, no police officer shall conduct any enquiry or inquiry or investigation into any offence alleged to have been committed by a public servant under this Act, where the alleged offence is relatable to any recommendation made or decision taken by such public servant in discharge of his official functions or duties, without the previous approval

"Provided further that the concerned authority shall convey its decision under this section within a period of three months, which may, for reasons to be recorded in writing by such authority, be extended by a further period of one month," it adds.

Ex-Admiral Prakash submits eligibility documents; set to be included in Goa's final roll

New Delhi,Agency: Former Indian Navy chief Admiral Arun Prakash (retired) on Monday reportedly submitted all the necessary documents linking him to the electoral roll from last special intensive revision (SIR), paving the way for early resolution of the matter relating to the system-driven notice issued to him after all the fields in his enumeration form (EF) pertaining to linkage with the last SIR roll, were left blank.

"The documents were collected by the competent field officer on Monday and the matter will be settled, perhaps by Tuesday, making the retired Admiral and his wife eligible for inclusion in the final electoral roll of Cortalim assembly constituency (AC) in Goa," an officer aware of the proceedings told media on Monday.

Similarly, a hearing due on Jan 16 on the notice served to Nobel laureate Amartya Sen, an elector in Bolpur AC of West Bengal, after the age of his mother, with whom he was mapped in



the EF filled and submitted by his relative, was reportedly found to be less than Sen's, is expected to sort out the anomaly. A hearing will be held at Sen's registered address at Shanti Niketan, and the relative will have the opportunity to correctly map Sen to the SIR from the last roll, said an officer.

In a clarification issued in Admiral

Prakash's case on Monday, the Cortalim ERO explained that his EF was categorised as "unmapped" after it was observed that the said EF did not contain the mandatory particulars relating to the previous SIR, including the name of the elector, EPIC number, name of the relative, name and number of the AC, part number, and serial number in the electoral roll. "In the absence of these essential identification details, the BLO application was unable to establish an automatic linkage between the submitted EF and the existing electoral roll database," the ERO said. Underlining that the BLO application is designed to automatically map EFs only when the prescribed identification particulars are duly filled in, the Cortalim ERO said the blank fields in Prakash's EF triggered the system to categorise his EF as "unmapped", mandating an auto-generated notice for further verification through a hearing mechanism.

Retail inflation inches up to 3-month high of 1.3% in December

New Delhi,Agency: Retail inflation inched up to a three-month high in Dec, led by narrowing deflation in some food prices and fading favourable base effect, but remained below the Reserve Bank of India's (RBI) tolerance level for the fourth month in a row.

Data released by the National Statistics Office (NSO) on Monday showed retail inflation, as measured by the consumer price index (CPI), rose an annual 1.3%, higher than the 0.7% in Nov and below the 5.2% in Dec 2024.

Food inflation contracted 2.7% in Dec and there is an increase of 120 basis points compared to Nov. Rural inflation was at 0.8% while urban was at 2% during Dec.

Core inflation, which excludes food and fuel, soared to a 28-month high of 4.8% during the month, up from 4.4% in Nov, led



by a sharp spike in gold and silver prices, which surged 69% and 97% year-on-year, respectively. Excluding these metals, core inflation moderated to 2.3% in Dec.

The increase in overall inflation and food inflation during Dec was largely attributed to increase in inflation of personal care and effects, vegetables, meat and fish, egg, spices and pulses and products. Personal care and effects, which includes gold and silver, rose 28.1% in Dec.

Maha civic polls: Voter ID cards found in garbage



Chhatrapati Sambhaji Nagar,Agency: The discovery of several Aadhaar, PAN, and voter identity cards in a garbage heap at Savarkar Chowk in Jalna city Sunday, barely three days ahead of the municipal corporation elections in Maharashtra, has raised

concerns, reports Mohammed Akhef. Officials said the model code of conduct cell received a complaint, stating that 17 Aadhaar cards, three, PAN cards, and four voter ID cards - 24 in all - were found discarded. An FIR was lodged in the case.

Gen-Z protests in 3 Asian nations must be examined: Manish Tewari

New Delhi,Agency: Congress MP Manish Tewari said there should be a deep study of the Gen-Z protests that brought down govts in three South Asian countries in the last three years to check if they were organic movements arising out of grievances.

Tewari said these movements should be examined for the critical difference between autonomous agitations over grievances, and agitations driven by narratives where grievances may have been weaponised. Though he did not point at any country which could have virtually carried out coups in Asia in the name of youth protests, his remark



suggested that suspicions could not be simply brushed off. Starting with Sri Lanka, protests brought down elected govts in Nepal and Bangladesh — all in the Indian neighbourhood.

The note of caution came as Tewari spoke about the

turbulent contemporary world, from Venezuela to Bangladesh to Greenland to Ukrainian invasion, at the launch of his new book "A World Adrift". The book was released by former foreign minister Yashwant Sinha at IIC, and the gath-

ering included P Chidambaram, Ghulam Nabi Azad, Vivek Tankha, Mukul Wasnik, and a host of foreign delegates, among others.

As he spoke on raging geopolitical issues, Tewari dismissed the belief that "India has lost Bangladesh" after protests toppled the Sheikh Hasina govt that set in motion developments which have increased the friction between India and Bangladesh. He said India invested blood and treasure in creating Bangladesh under the leadership of Indira Gandhi, and "that reality is not lost on the people of Bangladesh".

Delhi CM distributes Rs 25.25 crore scholarships to 1,709 students

New Delhi,Agency: Coinciding with the birth anniversary of Swami Vivekananda, Delhi Chief Minister Rekha Gupta on Monday distributed scholarships worth Rs 25.25 crore to 1,709 meritorious students from economically weaker sections under the Delhi Higher and Technical Education Assistance Scheme.

Addressing the scholarship distribution programme at Thyagaraj Stadium, Gupta said providing financial assistance to students was the Delhi government's investment in their future and a step towards strengthening the city's youth.

The event was attended by Education Minister Ashish Sood, senior officials of the Education Department, vice chancellors of various universities, educationists and a large number of students, according to a statement.

The chief minister said that scholarship amounts for the academic years 2023-24 and 2024-25



had been transferred directly to the bank accounts of eligible students studying in universities across Delhi. She also informed that a pending scholarship amount of Rs 19 crore from the previous government's tenure had been released by the present government, asserting that no funds earmarked for students'

education would remain pending in future.

Marking National Youth Day, Gupta urged students to draw inspiration from the thoughts and philosophy of Swami Vivekananda and to pursue their goals with dedication and discipline.

She said the progress of the

nation depended on the advancement of its youth and highlighted the role of young people in achieving the goal of a developed India by 2047.

The chief minister also said that national development was not possible through government policies alone and required the collective responsibility and active participation of citizens.

The scholarship amount is transferred directly to beneficiaries' bank accounts through the Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT) system, it added.

its wisdom in laboring over
the past. Surprisingly, par-
liamentary debates reveal
so many pages of the past
that we're convinced that

this very past is holding
back our golden present.
Now, even I'm beginning to
believe that every short-
coming of the present is
due to some ancestor. In
this context, I've read the
wills of my elders many
times, and now it's even
come to the point of letters.
My grandfather wrote to
my father, and then my
father wrote to me. Both
share similar compulsions,
similar language. The

house that my grandfather
left to my father, my father
gave me the same house to
say goodbye to. Now I want
to show it to the world. I
have lofty dreams, but the
house associated with the
past is so low that I can't
even speak to anyone loud-
ly. In fact, we can curse the
past by looking at the pres-
ent around us. If we were
born in America, we would
have enjoyed the luxury of
the dollar, but Gandhi and

Nehru never considered the
past. If at that time, a hun-
dred or two hundred more
universities, IITs, IIMs or
AIIMS had been opened,
then today we would not
have to look back. We have
to look back because the
past only saw the present.
This is wrong; the present
should always look at the
past. That's why the pres-
ent country has started
looking at the country of
the past.

Uneasy Panchayat elections

The government's conscience is at stake
in the court 's landmark decision, while
the world is preoccupied with a list of
admonitions. Who is the big man here,
and who is Himachal's biggest issue in
protecting the law? Clearly, the
Honorable High Court has elevated its
decision by directing the Himachal gov-
ernment to hold elections for Panchayati
Raj institutions before April 30th. This
way, will the Election Commission gain
the key to unlocking all the locks of the
electoral process, or will it be too late to
turn this into a one-sided test? The State
Election Commissioner can keep a close
eye on the preparations, but if the instru-
ments of government remain idle, who
will play the harp of the exercise?
However, what is being witnessed is not
so beautiful or ordinary that an election
tent should be set up. Himachal has wit-
nessed the wounded feet of relief on the
rough roads of disaster, and has also seen
that politics does not begin to share even
in the state's best interests. In such a situ-
ation, politics will want to write many
things on the announced plank of
Panchayati Raj elections. The govern-
ment's response to the court's decision is
unsubstantiated, and therefore, further
clarity on the legal text will emerge only
when administrative action is taken. How
Panchayat elections are exempted from
the Disaster Management Act, in effect
since October, will remain a point of con-
tention. Through its observations, the
court identified several unrealistic flaws
in the government's intentions.

To compensate for the
impact on the US market,
India will need to increase
exports through free trade
agreements (FTAs) in
2026, while also pursuing
a strategy to expand
exports to 200 markets
globally identified by
India as alternative mar-
kets. It is being highlight-
ed both nationally and
internationally that
India's FTAs ??are playing
a significant role in
increasing exports to
countries other than the
US, even amid Trump's
tariff challenges.
Meanwhile, with the for-
mation of FTAs ??with
several countries in the
new year 2026, India's
exports will increase rap-
idly. The various FTAs
??entered into by India,
which provide legally
binding commitments on
professional services such
as software engineers,
chartered accountants,
and architects, will open
up global opportunities
for Indian professionals
and boost professional
services exports. It is
worth noting that on
December 22nd, Prime
Minister Narendra Modi
and New Zealand Prime
Minister Christopher
Luxon announced the
FTA between India and
New Zealand.



Prime Minister Modi stat-
ed that the India-New
Zealand partnership is
poised to reach new
heights and that this FTA
will help double bilateral
trade over the next five
years. This FTA ensures
zero tariffs on 100 percent
of Indian exports to New
Zealand. New Zealand has
also committed to \$20 bil-
lion in FDI in India over
the next 15 years. India
has offered duty reduc-
tions on 70 percent of
New Zealand's products,
representing 95 percent of
bilateral trade value. A key
strength of this FTA is its
ability to increase services
exports from India and
encourage Indian profes-
sionals to pursue opportu-
nities in New Zealand.
This FTA provides a
strong foundation for
Indian talent, startups,
and innovation. This FTA
offers India key services

that are not covered by
any previous FTA. Just
four days before the India-
New Zealand FTA, on
December 18, Commerce
and Industry Minister
Piyush Goyal and his
Omani counterpart, Qais
bin Mohammed Al
Yousuf, signed the FTA in
Muscat in the presence of
Prime Minister Narendra
Modi and Sultan Haitham
bin Tariq of Oman. This
FTA is officially called the
Comprehensive Economic
Partnership Agreement
(CEPA). It is also signifi-
cant that under the
India-Oman FTA, 98
percent of India's
exports will get zero-cost
access to the Omani
market. This includes
more than 99 percent of
exports to Oman.
This agreement is
expected to significantly
benefit India's textile,
gems and jewelry, phar-

maceuticals, automo-
biles, agricultural prod-
ucts, and leather indus-
tries. Significantly, new
data published during
the Modi government's
tenure regarding the
progress of FTAs
??signed with Mauritius,
the United Arab
Emirates (UAE), and
Australia show that
while trade with these
countries has grown rap-
idly, exports to these
countries are also
increasing. India is
receiving more invest-
ment from these coun-
tries.
The European Free Trade
Association (AFTA)
between India and four
European countries:
Iceland, Switzerland,
Norway, and
Liechtenstein, came into
effect on October 1st, and
exports to AFTA coun-
tries have begun to
increase. Similarly,
India's FTAs ??with the
United Kingdom, New
Zealand, and Oman will
become effective in 2026.
Furthermore, 2026 will
also see FTAs ??taking
shape with other key
countries, including the
United States, the
European Union, Peru,
Chile, ASEAN, Mexico,
Canada, South Africa,
Israel, and the Gulf
Countries Council.

Lohri is a festival that brings happiness

**Lohri is a major
festival celebrat-
ed with great
enthusiasm in
North India. It
brings a moment
of peace in the
hectic modern
world, where peo-
ple forget all their
worries and enjoy
the festival with
great enthusiasm
and joy. In
Punjab and
Jammu and
Kashmir, Lohri is
celebrated as
Makar Sankranti.
Sindhi communi-
ties also celebrate
a festival called
'Lal Lahi' as
Lohri, a day
before Makar
Sankranti. Some
folk tales are also
prevalent regard-
ing Lohri.**

It is believed that on this
day, Kansa sent a demoness
named Lohita to kill Lord
Krishna, whom Lord
Krishna playfully killed,
and this festival began to be
celebrated in memory of
that incident. Another folk
tale regarding the lighting
of the fire on Lohri is that
the fire is lit on this day in
memory of the yogic burn-
ing of Sati, daughter of
Daksha Prajapati. The
most popular story related
to Lohri is related to a
dacoit named Dulla Bhatti,
who is known as the
'Punjabi Robin Hood'. Just
as is done during Holi,
wood is collected and bon-
fires are lit on Lohri, and
the fire is worshipped with
sesame seeds. The day of
this festival is bitterly cold,
with temperatures often
hovering between minus
five degrees Celsius and
dense fog in most parts of
North India. Despite the
cold, people's enthusiasm
for the festival is palpable.
On the auspicious occasion
of Lohri, people celebrate
with great enthusiasm by

lighting bonfires outside
their homes. This festival is
also believed to be linked to
the celebration that bids
farewell to winter, invoking
the Sun God, who is said to
warm the earth with his
rays this month so that the
cold does not harm anyone
and people can easily cope
with the winter season. It is
believed that the winter
begins to subside from this
day. People light bonfires
outside their homes to pro-
tect themselves from the
cold and also worship fire,
so that, with the blessings
of Agnidev, happiness and
prosperity may prevail in
their homes. In Haryana
and Punjab, Lohri holds
special significance in fam-
ilies where a new marriage
has taken place, a child
(boy) has been born, or it is
the first wedding anniver-
sary. A festive atmosphere
prevails in these families on
the occasion of Lohri.
Relatives, along with the
people living nearby, also
participate in this celebra-
tion. People gather around
a fire lit in the house or in
an open space outside the

house, warming themselves
by offering peanuts, jag-
gery, sesame seeds, rewari,
roasted corn kernels, etc.,
and entertain themselves
and exchange greetings by
dancing Bhangra and
Giddha all night long.

Lohri has long been associ-
ated with a Brahmin girl
named Sundari and a noto-
rious bandit named Dulla
Bhatti. Dulla Bhatti used to
rob the rich and distribute
the wealth among the poor.
Legend has it that in the
Ganjibar region, now in
Pakistan, there lived a
Brahmin who had a beauti-
ful daughter named
Sundari, whose beauty was
the talk of the town. When
the king of Ganjibar
learned of her, he resolved
to make Sundari the pride
of his harem. He sent a
message to Sundari's
father, urging him to send
his daughter to his harem.
He offered the Brahmin
various inducements, but
he refused to give his
daughter to the king. He
was at a loss for what to do.
When he couldn't think of
anything, he remembered
Dulla Bhatti, a notorious

bandit who lived in the for-
est and was always ready to
help the poor and
oppressed. The distraught
Brahmin took his daughter,
Sundari, to him that very
night and explained every-
thing in detail. Dulla Bhatti
consoled the Brahmin after
listening to his plight and
that very night, he found a
suitable Brahmin boy and
considering Sundari as his
own daughter, he gave her
away in marriage with that
young man. When the king
of Ganjibar learned of this,
he was furious. Upon his
orders, his army attacked
Dulla Bhatti's hideout, but
Dulla Bhatti and his com-
panions defeated the king.
Celebrating the defeat of
the ruler of Ganjibar at
Dulla Bhatti's hands, the
people of Ganjibar lit bon-
fires and danced Bhangra,
singing songs in praise of
Dulla Bhatti. It is said that
since then, Sundari and
Dulla Bhatti have been par-
ticularly remembered in
the songs sung on the occa-
sion of Lohri. Before Lohri,
children gather together
and go from door to door
singing Lohri songs, asking
for Lohri. Children also

gather
several days in advance to
collect wood and cow dung
cakes for the festival.
However, with the passage
of time, the tradition of
begging for wood from door
to door is fading away. In
many places, people are
now purchasing wood and
cow dung cakes instead of
having children collect
them. On Lohri, prepara-
tions for the night's festivi-
ties begin early in the
morning. At night, people
light bonfires outside their
homes, circumambulate
them, throw sesame seeds,
jaggery, rewari, chidwa,
popcorn, and other items
into the fire, and bow their
heads. Then, they sit
around the bonfire and
warm themselves. Then
begins the captivating
gidda and bhangra dances,
which continue late into the
night, sometimes even
throughout the night.

The next morning, when
the bonfire cools down, the
neighborhood takes the
ashes home, considering
them a gift from God. This
festival truly sets a unique
example of love and broth-
erhood in society.

Inequality top economic concern for youth globally: WEF survey

New Delhi,Agency: Growing inequality between the rich and poor is the top-most economic concern for the youth across the world, while a large number of them want to run for political office rather than just critique, a new survey showed on Monday.

The World Economic Forum's Youth Pulse 2026: Insights from the Next Generation for a Changing World 2026 report sought to know how the next generation is interpreting, and responding to, rapid economic, political, technological and environmental change.

The survey, drawing insights from nearly 4,600 young people aged 18–30 in 144 countries and territories, found that 48.2 per cent identify 'growing inequality between the rich and poor' as the top economic trend shaping the future.

Yet in regions such as Sub-Saharan Africa and South Asia, entrepreneurship emerged as the most powerful economic force – reflecting growing confidence in innovation and self-determination

as key drivers of opportunity.

More than 57 per cent cited financial concerns among their biggest sources of stress or anxiety.

The study also found that youth priorities are practical and policy-ready. The most-cited empowering measures were creating employment opportunities for youth (57.2 per cent), equal access to affordable, quality education (46.1 per cent), and affordable housing and financial independence (32.2 per cent).

Showing that trust is earned close to home, young people rated community leaders as most effective in driving positive change (60 per cent), reinforcing demand for leadership that is proximate, accountable and delivers tangible results.

Despite concern over geopolitical tensions and democratic erosion, nearly half of respondents highlighted positive political shifts – from innovative governance models and greater civic participation to stronger international cooperation and the inclusion of under-represented groups in policy-making.



It also found that it was a generation ready to govern, not just critique, as 36 per cent said they are likely to run for political office, challenging assumptions of political apathy. Climate remained the defining global concern, even under economic strain, in the survey. More than 56 per cent identified climate change and environmental degradation as the greatest threat to the world; personally, 51 per cent cited inflation and instability as their greatest worry, while 41 per cent identified

climate change as the second most significant threat to their lives.

The report also documented more than 800 youth-led solutions advanced over the past year directly reaching over 2.2 million people worldwide.

A vast majority of 95 per cent said that intentionally designed youth communities provide a critical space for learning, growth, and dialogue.

On technology, two-thirds of respondents believed AI would reduce entry-level job opportunities, underscoring awareness of disruption and the need for adaptive skills and forward-looking policies and systems.

Nearly 60 per cent of young people reported using AI regularly to enhance their skills, with another third experimenting occasionally. Only a small minority was not yet engaged with AI tools.

Regular AI use among young people was found to be high across regions, challenging assumptions that digital innovation is concentrated in a few markets.

Doubling screen count in 5 years can generate 1.25 lakh jobs, add Rs 950 crore tax for govt: Report

New Delhi,Agency: The Indian film exhibition industry can generate 1.25 lakh jobs and contribute an additional tax of Rs 950 crore for the government exchequer by doubling the screen count in the country in the next five years, according to a joint report.

However, the number of cinema screens in India has seen a marginal increase from 9,527 in 2019 to 9,927 in 2024, said a joint report from Multiplex Association of India and E&Y.

Moreover, India's filmed entertainment revenues have fallen 2 per cent from their peak in 2019, decreasing from Rs 19,100 crore to Rs 18,746 crore in 2024.

It had suggested “increasing India's screen count to 20,000” helped by



measures such as tax holidays to new screens set up in 19,000 pin codes where there are currently no screens.

It has recommended deregulating the cinema exhibition industry in terms of ticket pricing, akin to the hospitality sector and grant

the exhibition segment industry status so that electricity, which is a key cost, can be paid at industrial tariffs, rather than higher retail rates.

The report also recommended permitting alternate use of theatres to take advantage of the massive

growth in live events, MICE and experiences and also to permit 24x7 operation of cinema infrastructure to enable increased monetisation.

According to the report, screens per million of the population has fallen from 7.6 in 2018 to 6.8 in 2024. This also compare unfavourably with other large content production economies like the US (109 screens/ million), UK (66 screens/million) and China (64 screens/million).

Moreover, the industry is also facing challenges such as shortening of theatrical window period.

“Theatrical window of 90 days before the release of a film on OTT was a pre-pandemic norm, but has

Inflation rises to 3-month high of 1.33 in December remains below RBI tolerance band

New Delhi,Agency: Retail inflation rose to a three-month high of 1.33 per cent in December, mainly due to higher prices of food items, but remained below the Reserve Bank of India's (RBI) lower tolerance level.

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) based headline inflation was 0.71 per cent in November and 5.22 per cent in December 2024. The inflation stood at 1.44 per cent in September.

The food inflation in December was (-) 2.71 per cent compared to (-) 3.91 per cent in November, and remained negative for the seventh consecutive month.

“The increase in headline inflation and food inflation during the month of December 2025 is mainly attributed to an increase in inflation of personal care and effects, vegetables, meat and fish, egg, spices and pulses and products,” National Statistics Office (NSO) said while releasing the CPI data.

The headline inflation in urban



areas was higher at 2.03 per cent compared to 0.76 per cent in rural India.

The retail inflation remained below RBI's lower tolerance limit for the fourth consecutive month in December.

The government has mandated the central bank to ensure inflation remains at 4 per cent, with a margin of 2 per cent on either side.

According to the NSO data, the top five major states with high inflation during December were Kerala (9.49

per cent), Karnataka (2.99 per cent), Andhra Pradesh (2.71 per cent), Tamil Nadu (2.67 per cent), and Jammu and Kashmir (2.26 per cent).

On the other hand, retail inflation was negative in Assam, Bihar, Haryana, Madhya Pradesh, Odisha, and Uttar Pradesh.

Aditi Nayar, Chief Economist at Ibra, said the retail inflation expectedly rose to 1.3 per cent in December 2025 from 0.7 per cent in November, while printing marginally lower than Ibra's estimate of 1.4 per cent for the month.

The uptick was driven by narrower deflation in the food and beverages segment, as well as hardening inflation in the miscellaneous items, she said.

“While the December 2025 MPC minutes suggest a possibility of another rate cut in February 2026, Ibra believes that a pause is warranted at the current juncture.

Keeping in mind the preparations for the T20 World Cup 2026, Healy has decided to stay away from T20 Internationals. Alyssa Healy, niece of former Australian legendary wicket-keeper Ian Healy, made her international debut against New Zealand in 2010 at the age of 19. By the end of her

career, she will have played 162 T20Is, 6 ODIs, and 11 Test matches for Australia. She holds a record 6 dismissals in T20I cricket.

Alyssa Healy assumed the full-time captaincy of Australia in 2023 after Meg Lanning's retirement. Her biggest achievement as captain was the historic 16-0 Ashes clean sweep against England. Under her leadership, Australia reached the semi-finals of the 2024 Women's T20 World Cup and the 2025 Women's ODI World Cup.

Alyssa Healy, one of the most explosive batsmen and best wicket-keepers in women's cricket, has been part of eight ICC World Cup-winning campaigns (six T20Is and two ODIs). She holds several records, including the highest individual score in a

World Cup final and the most dismissals by a wicketkeeper in women's T20Is. She was also a member of Australia's gold medal-winning team at the 2022 Commonwealth Games.

In terms of individual awards, Healy was awarded the Belinda Clark Award in 2019, and was also the ICC Women's T20I Cricketer of the Year in 2018 and 2019.

In domestic cricket, Alyssa Healy represented the Sydney Sixers in 11 seasons of the Women's Big Bash League, scoring over 3,000 runs and winning two titles. She also played two seasons in the Women's Premier League and captained the Uttar Pradesh Warriors.

Announcing her retirement, Alyssa Healy said in an official statement, "It is with mixed emotions that I announce that the upcoming series against India will be my last for Australia. I still love playing for my country, but the competitive edge that has driven me for so many years is no longer the same. I feel this is the right time."She added, "I will not be part of this year's T20 World Cup and, given the team's limited preparation, I will not play in the T20 matches against India. But it will be special for me to end my career captaining the ODI and Test teams on home soil."

Madrid, Agency: Spsh football giant Real Madrid has announced the separation of its head coach Xabi Alonso by mutual consent. The club gave this information on Monday. In place of Alonso, the club has appointed its Castilla (B team) coach Alvaro Arbeloa as the new head coach of the first team. This decision was taken after the 2-3 defeat against arch-rivals Barcelona in the Spsh Super Cup final played on Sunday. Currently, Real Madrid is four points behind Barcelona, ??which is at the top of the La Liga points table. Xabi Alonso took charge of Real Madrid on June 1, 2025. He previously had a stellar stint with German club Bayer Leverkusen, where he won the domestic double (league and cup) in the 2023-24 season and led the team to the Europa League final. Alonso's start with Real Madrid was also impressive. After leading the team to the semi-finals of the Club World Cup, he won 13 of the next 14 matches. The only major defeat during this period came in a derby against Atletico Madrid.However, after the Champions League defeat against Liverpool on November 4, the team's performance declined. Real Madrid subsequently recorded just two wins in eight matches.

Brought up with an aim of playing for the nation, Sharma termed the success an early phase of her career. "I am getting all the sup-

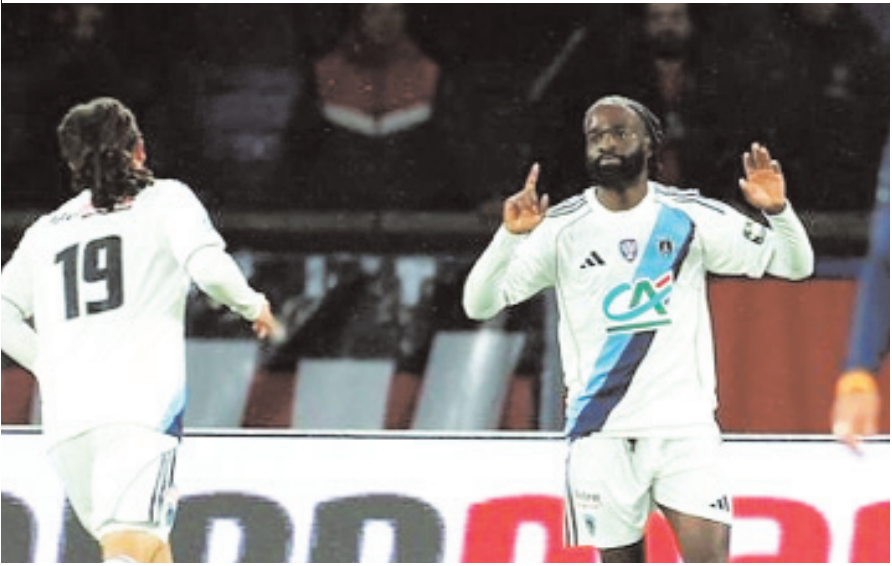
port. The team really backed me, and whatever happened against Gujarat Giants, I dedicate it to the team," she said.

Paris FC pull off a major upset, knocking defending champions PSG out of the French Cup



Paris,Agency: The French Football Cup witnessed a major upset as Paris FC defeated defending champion and record 16-time winner Paris Saint-Germain (PSG) 1-0 to enter the last-16 of the tournament. The match was played at the Parc des Princes stadium on Monday night. The hero of the match was former PSG academy player Jonathan Ikonen, who stunned his former team by scoring the winning goal in the last 20 minutes after coming on as a substitute. With this defeat, PSG suffered their first home defeat in the French Cup since 2022, while it was their first defeat in the last-32 stage since 2014. After scoring, Ikonen told France Television, "We are very happy. We defended brilliantly. I am extremely pleased with my goal. It is a happy moment for me and I hope it will not be my last."

Before the match, former PSG captain Mamadou Sako announced his retirement on the field. Sako began his career at the Paris FC academy and later joined PSG.

The two teams also faced each other earlier this month in the Paris Derby, the first in the top division since 1990. Goals from Desire Doue and Ousmane Dembele helped PSG win 2-1. PSG then won the French Champions Trophy by defeating Marseille in a penalty shootout in Kuwait.

Newly promoted Paris FC, backed by luxury brands LVMH and Red Bull, currently sit 15th in the Ligue 1 table and are two

points above the relegation play-off spot.

Speaking of the match, PSG dominated the first half. Georgia's Khvicha Kvaratskhelia created several chances but couldn't convert. Alimamy Gori, who was replaced by Ikoné five minutes before halftime, had the best chance for Paris FC in the opening period.

In the 10th minute of the second half, poor passing by Paris FC center-back Mustapha Mbo gave PSG a big chance, but goalkeeper Obed Nkambadio punched out a brilliant shot from Gonçalo Ramos.

In the final 15 minutes of the game, as PSG continued to press, Paris FC launched a counterattack, and Ikoné capitalized on the opportunity. Seven minutes into injury time, Desire Doue's header came close to equalizing, while Nkambadio made a brilliant save from Vitinha's long-range shot to secure victory for his team.

Marseille will play against sixth-division team Bayo in the final match of this round.

The match will take place in front of a packed house at the Stade Michel-Dornano in Caen, Normandy. Bayeux, famous for its centuries-old tapestries, is the lowest-ranked team remaining in the tournament. The round of 16 draw will be held before the match.

On Saturday, former Wolves coach Gary O'Neill began his tenure as Strasbourg's new coach with a thumping 6-0 win over fourth-division Avranches.
