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Trump speaks in Davos: PM Modi is my great friend, a big India-US trade deal will happen soon

A major development has emerged from the 56th annual summit of the World Economic Forum, being held amidst the snow-capped mountains of Switzerland. US President Donald Trump has highly praised Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi and expressed hope that a significant trade agreement between the two countries will be concluded soon. In a special discussion during the summit, Trump called PM Modi a very good friend and said that he is very excited about the relations with India. Expressing deep respect for Prime Minister Modi in his address, Trump said, "PM Modi is a wonderful person and a very good friend of mine. We respect his leadership, and a big and effective trade deal between the US and India is going to happen very soon." This statement by President Trump is being seen as a reflection of India's growing



stature on the global stage and strengthening bilateral relations. Trump's positive stance comes at a time when trade negotiations between the two countries are at a crucial juncture. However, some challenges remain in the path of this much-awaited deal. For some time now, negotiators from both countries have been trying to reach a consensus on technical issues such as tariff rates and access to each other's markets. Disagreements have also arisen between the two countries on some issues, particularly related

to the energy and agriculture sectors. But Trump's latest statement has indicated that there is considerable political will for this deal. The Indian Ministry of External Affairs has also given positive signals in this direction. According to the ministry, India and the US have been in continuous contact for more than a year for a balanced trade agreement. Both countries are committed to a deal that will prove beneficial for both economies. Several rounds of these talks, which began in February 2025, have already been completed. Now, after

It's not that Trump's speech was being discussed for its policy points, but rather his slip of the tongue brought him into the spotlight. Interestingly, the

During his long address, several instances came to light that became the subject of much discussion on social media. At the beginning of his speech, Trump mentioned his diplomatic achievements on the international stage. Army vehicle falls into gorge in Doda, Jammu and Kashmir; 10 soldiers martyred



Doda: A tragic accident occurred in Doda district of Jammu and Kashmir on Thursday when an Indian Army Casper vehicle fell into a deep gorge. Ten soldiers were martyred in the accident, while 10 others were seriously injured. According to reports, the army vehicle was traveling on the Bhaderwah-Chamba road towards a high-altitude post. The road conditions were reportedly very poor. For reasons yet unknown, the driver lost control of the vehicle, causing the Casper to plunge into a gorge approximately 200 feet deep. Upon receiving information about the accident, the army, police, and rescue teams rushed to the spot and immediately launched a rescue operation. A swift rescue operation was carried out to pull the soldiers out of the gorge.

Death toll in Karachi shopping plaza fire rises to 61



Islamabad: The death toll from the massive fire that engulfed the Gul Shopping Plaza on MA Jinnah Road in Karachi, Pakistan, has risen to 61. Authorities confirmed on Wednesday that 30 bodies were recovered from a single shop inside the building. According to Dunya News, Deputy Inspector General of Police (South) Asad Raza said the bodies were found in a crockery shop. The removal of debris was temporarily halted to allow for the recovery of the bodies. He said it appears that many people locked themselves inside the shop to escape the smoke and flames after the fire broke out. Deputy Commissioner (South) Javed Nabi Khoso announced that Rescue 1122 has been directed to conduct a final search operation in the plaza. He said that after this operation is complete, the building will be demolished. The responsibility for demolishing the structure will rest with the Sindh Building Control Authority. More than 40 percent of the plaza has already collapsed.

This is the most opportune time to forge strategic partnerships with friendly nations: Air Force Chief

Indian Air Force Chief Air Chief Marshal AP Singh has shared a crucial and strategic perspective on the country's air defense. He emphasized that this is the most opportune time for India to forge strategic partnerships with reliable friendly nations for the development of next-generation air combat systems and weapons. Addressing a seminar on 'National Security Imperatives' in New Delhi, the Air Force Chief said that in view of future challenges, global cooperation for advanced military aircraft engines

and cutting-edge technology has now become imperative. The Air Force Chief specifically cited the recent defense cooperation with France as an example, stating that the decisions taken regarding the development of fighter aircraft engines can prove to be a strong foundation in this direction. Pointing to the current global turmoil, he warned that for any country, strengthening its military power, especially air power, is no longer an option but a necessity. According to him, India does not lack the necessary willpower and human resources to become self-reliant in the defense sector, but there are some

technological hurdles that require external cooperation to overcome. Air Chief Marshal emphasized that although India is capable of developing technology on its own, given the current regional security situation and the activities of neighboring countries, we do not have much time. He said that research and development efforts, along with quick decision-making under the Make in India initiative, are necessary to ensure the availability of required weapons and platforms in the near future. The Air Force Chief's statement comes at a time when the number of fighter aircraft in the Indian Air Force

fleet has decreased to 29 squadrons, the lowest level in the last six decades. At least 42 squadrons are considered necessary for the country's security. Recently, there has also been a major relief in the direction of increasing the combat capability of the Air Force. The Defence Acquisition Board has given its initial approval to the proposal to purchase 114 Rafale fighter aircraft from the French company Dassault Aviation. This entire process will be carried out under the Make in India framework, with the French company collaborating with an Indian partner to manufacture the fighter jets.



Election Commission launches ECI-Net app, all services available in one place

The Election Commission of India (ECI) formally launched the ECI-Net application on Friday, integrating more than 40 different types of online services into a single platform. The app was formally launched at Bharat Mandapam during the international conference of election management bodies of democratic countries in Delhi. During the launch, Chief Election Commissioner Gyanesh Kumar invited election management bodies from around the world to benefit from India's initiative. The Election

Commission is ready to develop this app for applicant bodies according to their needs, legal obligations, and language. Kumar said that ECI-Net will provide almost real-time information related to elections. Its beta version was tested during the Bihar Assembly elections. We also sought suggestions from the public. More than 15,000 suggestions have been received. He also offered this platform to election management bodies of other countries so that they can develop it according to their laws and language. He said that suggestions are welcome and ECI-Net will be continuously improved.

Meeting related to the PC&PNDT Act chaired by Deputy Commissioner Mrs. R. Ronita

Instructions were given to investigate and take action against illegally operating clinics. A crucial meeting concerning the PC&PNDT Act was held today in the office chamber of the Collectorate under the chairmanship of Deputy Commissioner, Khunti, Mrs. R. Ronita. All members of the concerned committee and doctors were present at the meeting. During the meeting, the Chief Medical Officer provided the members present with detailed information about the provisions of the PC&PNDT (Pre-Conception and Pre-Natal Diagnostic Techniques) Act. It was informed that out of a total of 9 ultrasound clinics in the district, 6 are currently operational under the PC&PNDT Act, and applications have been received for the operation of 2 new ultrasound clinics. In the meeting, the Deputy Commissioner stated that it is the responsibility of the committee members to ensure compliance with all the guidelines under the Act. All members were apprised of their roles and the implementation process. The Deputy Commissioner said that it is essential to ensure strict adherence to all the regulations for the operation of ultrasound clinics and other clinics, so that malpractices like sex determination of the fetus can be curbed and quality healthcare services can be ensured in private medical institutions. It is mandatory to have a doctor at the clinic, and a lab rate chart should also be displayed so that patients do not face any problems. Emphasis was placed on all members playing an active role in ensuring complete compliance with the Act, increasing public awareness, and conducting timely raids as needed. The meeting was attended by the Civil Surgeon, doctors, lawyers, AYUSH medical officers, and other concerned officials as members.

A minimum of two years of work experience is mandatory for admission. According to Ankur Madan, Director of the Faculty of Education at the university, the objective of these programmes is to provide teachers with practical and applicable understanding so that they can make their everyday classroom teaching and school-level academic work more effective.

IG Operations and police spokesperson Michael Raj S confirmed Anal's death. Eleven other Naxalites are also reported to have been killed in the encounter along with Anal.

Deputy Commissioner Directs Stamp and Registry Department to Increase Digital Registrations

A review meeting of the district's internal financial resources was held on Thursday in the Deputy Commissioner's auditorium at the Collectorate, chaired by Deputy Commissioner Manjunath Bhajantri. The objective of the meeting was to increase revenue from the district's internal sources (stamp duty, registration fees, mining royalties, market fees, transport fees, water tax, property tax) and ensure target achievement. In the meeting, the Deputy Commissioner said that the district administration aims to strengthen internal financial resources to increase self-reliance in development work. This will



make more funds available for the implementation of government schemes and enable faster execution of public welfare works. Fierce encounter between security forces and Maoists in Jharkhand, several Naxalites feared dead

A fierce encounter broke out between security forces and the CPI (Maoist) Naxalite organization in the dense and inaccessible Saranda forest of West Singhbhum district in Jharkhand on Thursday morning. The encounter, which took place in the Chotanagra police station area, saw heavy firing from both sides for a considerable period. According to initial reports, several Maoists are feared to have been killed in the encounter. There has been no official confirmation from the security forces yet. It is reported that senior officers of the CRPF and Jharkhand Police had received information about the presence of Naxalites in the



Saranda forest area. Based on this information, a joint team of Cobra, Jharkhand Jaguar, and district police launched a search operation in the area. As soon as the security forces approached the Naxalite hideouts, the Naxalites, finding themselves surrounded, opened indiscriminate fire. The security forces then retaliated. Seeing the security forces gaining the upper hand, the Naxalites managed to escape by taking

advantage of the dense forest and hilly terrain. After the encounter, the security forces have cordoned off the entire area and a large-scale search operation is underway. IG (Operations) Michael Raj S has confirmed the encounter. He said that an encounter has been going on between the police and Maoists since morning. It is noteworthy that the Saranda and Kolhan regions have long been Naxal-affected areas.

Signs of summer in Jharkhand, temperatures gradually rising

Summer is beginning to make its presence felt across the state. Temperatures have started to rise in various districts of the state, including the capital Ranchi. However, temperatures are still quite low in some districts, resulting in a feeling of cold in those areas. Gumla remains the coldest region in the state. On Thursday, the minimum temperature recorded there was 4.8 degrees Celsius, while the maximum temperature was 26 degrees Celsius. As for the hottest districts, Chaibasa and Seraikela recorded the highest temperatures in the state. In Chaibasa, the maximum temperature reached 30.4 degrees and the minimum temperature crossed 11 degrees, while in Seraikela, the maximum temperature was recorded at 30.3 degrees Celsius. The weather in the capital Ranchi is experiencing a mix of warm and cool conditions. On Thursday, the maximum temperature recorded here was 25 degrees and the minimum temperature was 9 degrees Celsius, while in Jamshedpur, the minimum temperature rose to over 13 degrees, which is 2.3 degrees higher than the normal



temperature. According to the Meteorological Department, fluctuations in weather are expected in the coming days. The department has predicted a 2 to 3 degree Celsius increase in temperature after Basant Panchami (January 23). During the last 24 hours, the highest temperature in the state was recorded in Chaibasa at 30.4 degrees Celsius and the lowest temperature in Gumla at 4.8 degrees Celsius. On Thursday, the weather remained clear throughout the day in Ranchi and surrounding areas, with moderate winds. There was also light fog in the morning, but the weather cleared completely later.

Ayurvedic Medical College and Hospital to Open in Jharkhand, Centre Gives Approval: Irfan

Jharkhand Health Minister Irfan Ansari met with Union Minister of State for Health and Family Welfare Pratap Rao Jadhav in New Delhi on Thursday. During the meeting, the central government agreed to establish an Ayurvedic medical college and hospital in Jharkhand. An Ayurveda college and hospital will soon open in Jharkhand. The minister said that a meeting was also held during his interaction with the Union Minister, where several proposals related to strengthening Jharkhand's healthcare system were discussed. The central government has given its in-principle approval to these proposals. Minister Irfan Ansari said that the state did not have an Ayurvedic medical college until now. Under the central government's



proposal, one government and one private Ayurvedic medical college and hospital will be established. In addition, the proposal to establish state-of-the-art high-tech labs equipped with Japanese technology in all medical

colleges of the state and Ranchi Sadar Hospital has also been approved. This will help improve diagnostic facilities and reduce the need for patients to travel outside the state for treatment. He said that an agreement has also been reached on increasing the number of MBBS seats from 100 to 250 in SNMCH, Dhanbad, and MGM Medical College, Jamshedpur, and other medical colleges, as well as increasing the number of postgraduate seats. The Union Minister said that this process will be taken forward after an inspection by an expert team. The minister said that an agreement has also been reached on the construction of Wellness Health Centers (Health Cottages) in all districts of the state, with financial assistance shared between the central and state governments in a 60:40 ratio.

Guru as ‘parent’, elephants on the road: Voter-roll fixes in Bengal get inventive

New Delhi,Agency: Monks and nuns may have renounced all trappings of worldly life — and many of them do not vote — but they, too, are being called for SIR (Special Intensive Revision) hearings, mainly for listing their spiritual gurus’ names under the ‘name of parent’ column in the electoral records. Taking cognisance of the inconvenience faced by monastic orders, the Election Commission (EC) has directed district election officers (DEOs) to conduct hearings at ashrams and religious institutions, instead of asking monks to travel to designated centres. In cases where supporting documents are unavailable, the DEO — who is the district magistrate — has been authorised to act as a quasi-judicial authority and clear voter applications.

The issue surfaced after several monks received hearing notices due to address and identity mismatch, caused by years of transfers between ashrams. Eighty-two-year-old Swami Muktikamananda, adhyaksha of the century-old Gadadhar Ashram (Ramakrishna Math) in Bhowanipur, south Kolkata, said his voter ID card and Aadhaar were linked to a Ramakrishna Math in Bankura (more than 200km from Kolkata), where he had stayed for an extended period. “I was initially asked to attend a hearing in Bankura, but after intervention by electoral officials, I submitted my enumeration form in Bhowanipur itself,” he said. Last Wednesday, around 90 monks attended a special SIR camp organised at Belur Math, with hearings held at



the Abhedananda Convention Centre. Participants included residents of the Belur headquarters as well as monks from centres such as the Ramakrishna Mission Ashrama in Narendrapur. While monks of the Ramakrishna Math and Mission do not vote, they seek inclusion in electoral rolls to avoid complications in visa applications and administra-

tive work. Monks from Bharat Sevashram Sangha (BSS) and Iskcon, many of whom do vote, have also received SIR notices. Swami Mahadevananda of BSS said several monks had listed founder Acharya Swami Pranavananda’s name as their parent, triggering document mismatches. General secretary Dilip Maharaj said

monks without passports attended a special hearing on Jan 20 at the Ballygunge headquarters. Iskcon spokesperson Radharamn Das said monks who had earlier voted in Kolkata had been asked to submit fresh documents from their native places across India and abroad. Avoiding elephant routes Voters in Jhargram and West Midnapore — in Bengal’s Jangalmahal, about 150km from Kolkata — have, over the years, learnt how to coexist with elephants. It’s a sort of mutual respect, born out of a certain wariness — and a tacit understanding: “Stay out of my hair, and I’ll stay out of yours.” During the SIR, regular elephant movement has coincided with a sudden rise in human movement — resi-

dents with voter detail anomalies are having to travel far and wide to arrive at hearing centres, a highly unsafe exercise. And, so, the poll body said yes when the two district administrations wanted to set up multiple hearing centres, located near human settlements, across six assembly constituencies. Similar arrangements are also being planned in elephant-heavy pockets of North Bengal. In West Midnapore, voters from select Jangalmahal villages will attend hearings at the Pirakata Community Hall, under the jurisdiction of Salboni police station. Salboni BDO Ruman Mondal said residents of villages such as Kalsibhanga, Satpati, Kalaimuri, Garmal, Lalgaria and Bhimpur were directed to appear at the new centre from Jan 15.

Bengaluru airport's flight of shame How Air India SATS staffer misused ‘manual frisking’ to molest South Korean businesswoman

Bengluru,Agency: South Korean businesswoman has accused an airline ground-handling employee of sexually assaulting her at Bengaluru’s Kempegowda International Airport, allegedly under the pretext of “manual frisking”. The 32-year-old woman was returning to South Korea on Monday when the incident occurred in the international departures area of Terminal 2, shortly after she had cleared immigration and security checks. How the incident unfolded According to the woman’s complaint, the incident took place around 10.45am. A man approached her after she



had completed Central Industrial Security Force (CISF) frisking and immigration formalities, identified himself as airport staff and asked to see her boarding pass. He then claimed there was a problem with her checked-in baggage, saying a beeping sound had been detected and that resolving

the issue would take time. He allegedly suggested an alternative — what he described as “manual frisking” — and asked her to accompany him. Police said the woman was taken to an area near the men’s washroom. There, under the guise of inspection, the man allegedly touched her chest

multiple times, asked her to turn around and then touched her private parts. When the woman objected, he allegedly hugged her, thanked her and told her she could leave. What police say The Kempegowda International Airport police said the accused has been identified as Mohammed Affaann Ahmed, 25, a ground-handling staff member with Air India SATS. Police said he had no authority to physically inspect passengers. According to investigators, the woman later reported the incident to airport security staff, who immediately detained the accused and alerted airport police.

Display West Bengal discrepancies, unmapped list by Jan 24: EC



New Delhi, Agency: Pursuant to the Jan 19 SC direction, Election Commission on Wednesday instructed the Bengal CEO to ensure that names of electors listed under “logical discrepancies” and “unmapped” categories under the SIR exercise are displayed by Jan 24 at gram panchayat bhawans, public places in talukas, block office of talukas as well as in ward offices of urban centres, reports Bharti Jain. People in these two categories can

submit documents/objections through their authorised representative, who can even be a booth level agent. However, there will be a signed/thumb-marked authority letter, by the person, in favour of such a representative. On Wednesday, EC wrote to Bengal chief secretary and DGP, asking them to provide adequate manpower to state CEO for deployment at panchayat bhawans/block offices .

Operation Trashi-I: Day 5 sees fresh encounter in J&K's Kishtwar; JeM terrorists holed up in dense forests

New Delhi,Agency: A fresh gunfight broke out on Thursday between security forces and holed-up terrorists during an ongoing search operation in the higher reaches of Jammu and Kashmir’s Kishtwar district, officials said. The operation, codenamed “Operation Trashi-I”, was launched in Sonnar village near Mandral-Singhpura in the Chatroo belt on Sunday. During the initial contact, three soldiers were injured when a search team encountered terrorists around noon in the Sonnar area, north-east of Chatroo. Officials said, "One of the search teams encountered a group of two to three foreign terrorists, believed to be affiliated with Pakistan-based Jaish-e-Mohammad (JeM). The terrorists allegedly opened indiscriminate fire and lobbed grenades in an attempt to breach the cordon." A major terrorist hideout was unearthed near the scene of the



encounter on Monday, and several individuals were picked up for questioning, the officials said. The situation escalated on Thursday morning when a fresh contact was established with the holed-up terrorists in the dense forests of Singhpura. "Heavy firing between the two sides was going on when last reports were received, and efforts are on to neutralise the terrorists operating in the area," officials said. A group of two to three terrorists allegedly affiliated with JeM are believed to be trapped in the encounter, according to the officials.

EC seeks WB reply for defying its order against poll officers

New Delhi,Agency: Taking exception to Bengal govt’s decision to unilaterally exonerate Baruipur Purba assembly constituency assistant electoral registration officer (AERO) Tathagata Mondal and impose only a minor penalty against Moyna AC AERO Sudipta Das — despite clear instructions by Election Commission (dated 05.08.2025) to suspend and initiate disciplinary proceedings against them — EC Wednesday asked the state chief secretary to get the competent authority to submit to the commission a written explanation for the “procedural lapse”. The explanation — sought by 5pm on Jan 24 — must detail the circumstances that led to non-compliance with the commission’s instructions, which had mandated that disciplinary authorities shall consult EC before closing or finalising any matter arising out of disciplinary proceedings initiated on the poll panel’s recommendation. “Since the disciplinary proceedings have been finalised without



adherence to the prescribed procedure and without mandatory consultation with the Commission, the Commission does not accept such finalisation of disciplinary action. Accordingly, the same shall be treated as procedurally irregular and non est in the eyes of the Commission, warranting reconsideration,” EC said in the letter sent to the state chief secretary. As part of the explanation sought by EC, the competent authority has been asked to furnish the complete disciplinary case records, including

the articles of charge, written statements of defence, inquiry reports, findings of the inquiry authority, orders of the disciplinary authority, file notings and all other relevant records forming the basis of the disciplinary action taken in respect of four officials, namely Tathagata Mondal, Debottam Dutta Choudhury, Biplab Sarkar and Sudipta Das. The commission had directed the state govt to suspend and initiate suitable disciplinary proceedings against the EROs/AEROs concerned and lodge FIRs against the erring officials, including the contractual data entry operator, under Section 32 of the RP Act, 1950, read with the relevant provisions of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita, 2023, and Information Technology Act, 2000. Sources said they were allegedly disposing of applications for inclusion in the electoral roll without proper verification or allowing a window for filing claims and objections.

New rule: 5 or more traffic offences in a year, you may be barred from driving

New Delhi,Agency: Five or more traffic offences in a year and you could be barred from driving. This provision — disqualification or revocation of driving licence (DL) — has been added by the road transport ministry through a fresh amendment to the Motor Vehicles Rules to rein in habitual errant drivers. The licencing authority — regional transport office (RTO) or district transport office (DTO) — has the power to decide on suspension of DL. The Rules also state that the licencing authority must give the licence holder an opportunity of being heard. The notification published on Wednesday said the condition of five or more offences of provisions of the

MV Act or Rules in a year for disqualification of DL commences from Jan 1. It added that “no offence or contravention recorded in any previous one-year period shall be taken into account for determining offences or contravention in any subsequent one-year period”. Till now there were 24 provisions in the Rules that could trigger the licencing authority concerned to initiate disqualification of DL. These included theft of vehicle, assault on passenger(s), abduction of passenger(s), driving beyond permitted speed limit, overloading and abandoning vehicle in a public space. These provisions have been made considering that these “constitute nuisance or danger to public”. Now, going by the new provision of five or

more traffic offences, such as not wearing helmet, seat belt and jumping red signal, can result in suspension of DLs. The new provision drew mixed reaction from experts in road traffic laws. Former Delhi deputy transport commissioner Anil Chhikara said that disqualification after five offences is a step in the right direction, but “the conflict is that people driving dangerously are not caught by traffic police”. He added that in absence of a standard operating procedure (SOP), traffic offences recorded using CCTV cameras are often challenged in courts. Hence, there is a need to have SOP and disposal guidelines, he said. Rohit Baluja, who teaches police, transport and judicial officers on

laws related to motor vehicles, termed the amendment “draconian and conceptually flawed”. He said, “Disqualification is a second-order enforcement tool, meant to follow fair, consistent, and credible primary enforcement. In a system where enforcement across states remains uneven, often revenue-driven, and weak on due process, such a provision will inevitably invite discretionary misuse by enforcement personnel.” “Instead of improving road safety, it risks punishing drivers for minor, repetitive infractions while ignoring the deeper structural causes of violations — poor traffic engineering, inadequate signage, confusing road layouts, and the absence of uniform deterrence for serious offences,” he said.

The ministry’s notification also specified the procedures for issuing, managing and paying traffic challans, or fines. It said that any police officer in uniform or any other officer authorised by state govt will issue a challan, either in physical or electronic form, and there can be auto-generation of e-challans. The violator can pay the challan or contest it within 45 days. Failure to contest within 45 days will be treated as deemed acceptance by the offender. In such a case, they must pay the penalty in the next 30 days. In case, a challan is challenged, the authority concerned must resolve it within 30 days and failure to adhere to this timeline, the challan will be quashed.

This is why Himachal has long been considered among the leading states in educational indicators. Himachal's model in health-care has also been cited as an example. The network of primary health centers, community health centers, and district hospitals significantly mitigated the chal-

lenges of the mountainous geography. Reduction in maternal and infant mortality rates, widespread vaccination, and improved life expectancy have proven that even the mountains can build a strong public health infrastructure with policy continuity and administrative commitment. Roads are Himachal's lifeline. After full statehood, road construction received top priority, as connectivity is a prerequisite for development.

Subhas Chandra Bose's presidential address to the Lahore Students' Conference in October 1929.

Has the Indian Republic, which has celebrated its golden jubilee, been able to realize Subhash Chandra Bose's dream of independence? No. But Netaji himself once offered a warning: "We have everything else, but the only thing we lack is self-sacrifice." We don't love our country deeply, and that's why Mir Jafar Amchand is born among us. Subhash Chandra Bose had long ago expressed his concern about the severe erosion of moral values ??in India and the utter lack of discipline that has permeated our lives. In the context of democracy, he once told Sardar Balwant Singh, an officer instructor of the Azad Hind Fauj, "I saw something in Japan and it struck me that to make a democratic system meaningful and successful in India, the children of the country must first be given the values ??that will shape an independent, self-reliant, and respectable nation, over a long period of two



decades."It's crucial for a strong and democratic system. Sitting on the top floor of a Japanese hotel, he was looking out the open window at the street below. He noticed a disciplined line of children crossing the public street, but there was no noise or jostling. They walked in a line, step by step, silently, with military discipline. Seeing this, Subhas Chandra Bose was astonished. He remembered his own country, the children there. He asked the hotel manager, "Where are these children going?" The manager replied, "You don't know, they're going to listen to your speech." That day was Subhas Chandra Bose's first speech in Japan. He asked the hotel manager again, but he couldn't give a precise answer about who had taught them such

discipline. But what happened next? Somehow, my question even reached General Tojo of Japan. Well, that day the speech took place. Several days passed. One day, I met General Tojo and told him that I wanted to see that school in his country. The children here have such strict discipline. General Tojo called and asked for a list of all the schools, handed it to me, and told me that there were a large number of schools. But after reviewing this list, mark any school you wish. We will take you there with full respect. We went to the school I had marked. Classes were in full swing. Initially, we went and stood in the room where the teacher was staying, but he didn't come to show any formality. Japan's most important person was standing

with us. In the room where we were, children were studying on the board, and the teacher was explaining with full concentration. This is a magnificent form of discipline that has become an essential part of Japanese civilian life. Netaji had a strong desire that when India became independent, all children should be compulsorily taught the discipline, brotherhood, love, loyalty, and virtues of military life within the first two decades. Studies should continue alongside this. In 20 years, India too would embrace discipline. After this, no one would have to learn a systematic way of life. Then no one will dare point a finger at our fellow citizens. This education will make India's democratic system more efficient. Incidentally, Netaji's views are also noteworthy: study and contemplation are the only means to eliminate the ego and disappointment that result from success or failure in any endeavor and to cultivate self-control. Only then can a person develop internal discipline. Without internal restraint, external restraint cannot be permanent.

In America, presidents change, but not the system

It is very important for Indian leaders to understand that instead of toeing the line of a selfish country like America, it is necessary to make long-term effective policies for the strength of India... The United States considers itself the foremost protector of democracy, human rights, and universal freedom. But history repeatedly proves that while faces change in the White House and the vocabulary of beliefs shifts, the fundamental nature and direction of the American power apparatus remain largely unchanged.

A deeper look reveals that America is governed not by one individual, but by a well-structured, organized, and long-term system. This system prioritizes national interests and determines friends, partners, and adversaries based on those interests. This can be understood simply by not directly occupying the country but by engaging in military intervention, political influence, subversion, and indirect control, including in Iraq, Iran, Afghanistan, Vietnam, Cuba, the Philippines, Panama, the Dominican Republic, Ukraine, Nicaragua, and most recently, Venezuela. Furthermore, the United States maintains a broad and influential presence worldwide through over 100 major companies, including Alphabet, Amazon, Apple, Tesla, Meta Platforms, Microsoft, Google, Walmart, Coca-Cola, PepsiCo, and Nvidia. The structure of American democracy is based on the concept of "checks and balances." While the president heads the executive branch, Congress and the Supreme

Court constantly monitor his powers. Major decisions such as war, the budget, and international agreements are impossible without institutional consensus. This ensures that power is not concentrated in the hands of a single individual, which is why the basic direction of American foreign policy remains intact despite changes in power. Furthermore, a permanent traditional power structure remains active in the United States, commonly referred to as the "deep state." The Pentagon, intelligence agencies, the State Department, the military-industrial lobby, multinational corporations, and influential think tanks all jointly shape America's long-term strategies. Presidents come and go, but this system remains the same for decades. The most effective weapon of American power, more than its vast military, is its economic dominance. The dollar remains the fulcrum of the global economy. International trade, oil and energy deals, loans, and financial transactions are linked to the dollar in one way or another. American influence over institutions

like the IMF, World Bank, and SWIFT gives it the ability to severely cripple a country's economy without resorting to war. Therefore, when the US finds a country hostile to its interests, it first resorts to economic sanctions. Trade blockades, banking isolation, and technical restrictions are all measures taken to undermine that country's internal stability. Instead of directly declaring a country an enemy, the US categorizes it as a "threat." Moral pressure is then exerted by raising issues like human rights, democracy, and freedom of the press on international forums. This narrative is so powerful that many countries are compelled to side with the US. The bitter experiences of direct war have taught the US that direct military intervention can be costly, risky, and unpopular in domestic politics. Therefore, it has adopted a policy of proxy warfare. Without engaging in war itself, it pursues its interests by providing arms, money, and diplomatic support to local or regional powers. The Ukraine-Russia conflict is a clear example of this. While the

US is not directly involved in the war, its influence is clearly visible through the backdoor supply of weapons and dollars. This can be best understood from the recently approved bill by the US President, the "Sanctioning Russia Act of 2025," which aims to pressure countries that are purchasing cheap crude oil from Russia amid the Ukraine war. When a country's government openly challenges US strategic interests, attempts at regime change begin. Supporting coups, overt or covert support for opposition forces, and attempts to influence public opinion through the media and NGOs are all part of the same strategy. Unless the fundamental nature of the American power structure changes, regardless of who is president, the world will face the same strategy: a strategy based on force, pressure, and control. In light of this analysis, it becomes imperative that the Indian government and our policymakers, instead of creating freebies for our citizens, formulate policies to build a strong, prosperous, and powerful India, including a strong defense

system based on indigenous technology, an independent foreign policy, and a self-reliant India, ensuring India's long-term interests are protected. This statement from King Bhartrihari's famous text, "Veer Bhogya Vasundhara," warns us that we must always prioritize our own security. Furthermore, the Indian government's chief strategists should comprehensively analyze the four types of policies outlined in our ancient scriptures—Saam, Daam, Dand, Bhed—in addition to key texts like Chanakya Niti, Vidur Niti, Bhishma Niti, Manu Niti (Manusmriti), Shukra Niti, Brihaspati Niti, and Garga Niti, which provide practical guidance for governance, war, economics, religion, and personal life, and incorporate their practical ideas into their strategy. It is crucial for Indian leaders to understand that, rather than pandering to a selfish country like the United States, it is essential to formulate long-term, effective policies for India's strength, because global politics is driven not by ideals but by the protection of self-interest.

He linked this surge to the November 5 election, stating that the election outcome provided



clarity on his administration's approach to tariffs. According to Trump, tariffs are aimed at protecting the country, which he said had been taken advantage of for years.

Trump noted that the estimated USD 600 billion in tariff revenue does not include additional investments by countries and compes setting up operations in the United States.

According to him, the presence of a large US delegation at Brand USA Travel Week India reflects the growing importance of the market. The delegation includes about 75 representatives from US destinations and travel businesses engaging with Indian travel trade partners and media from across the country.

Looking ahead, Dixon said 2026 would be a landmark year for US tourism, driven by a convergence of major global events.

"It's an incredible year for us. In

2026, you've got three major events happening in the United States that are really once in a lifetime," he said.

Highlighting the FIFA World Cup, Dixon said, "The FIFA World Cup is coming to the US this summer. It'll be in the months of June and July, and it's the largest World Cup ever, with 48 teams in 11 host cities across the US, from Seattle to Miami."

He added that the tournament would generate excitement not just for football fans but also for local communities across the country.

The World Cup will coincide with the 250th anniversary of the United States, with celebrations peaking around July 4, while 2026 will also mark a major anniversary of Route 66, one of America's most iconic highways.

"It's probably the greatest symbol of the great American road trip," Dixon said, adding that Indian travellers are increasingly interested in self-drive holidays across the US.

Policy focus on innovation & stability and consumer protection to support long-term growth in India: RBI

New Delhi, Agency: The policy focus on maintaining a balance between consumer protection, innovation, and a prudent regulatory approach will help support long-term economic growth in India, according to a report by the Reserve Bank of India (RBI).

According to the RBI, the latest findings of the financial structure of India have reaffirmed the strength of the financial system. The stress test results showed that both banks and non-banking financial compes (NBFCs) are capable of withstanding losses under adverse scenarios, while maintaining capital lev-

els well above the regulatory minimum.

The RBI report stated that going forward, a policy approach that carefully balances innovation and stability, along with consumer protection and prudent regulation and supervision, will be crucial in improving productivity and sustaining long-term economic growth. It stated "the policy focus on striking a balance between innovation and stability, consumer protection, and a prudent approach to regulation and supervision should help improve productivity and support long-term economic



growth".

The report noted that banks remain well supported by strong capital buffers, improved asset quality, and robust profitability, even in a challenging global environment.

The report also took note

of the global environment as the year 2026 began with an escalation of geopolitical tensions. It highlighted developments such as US intervention in Venezuela, the continuing conflict in the Middle East, uncertainty around the Russia-Ukraine peace deal, and the escalation of the row over Greenland. These factors, the RBI said, point to still-elevated geo-economic risks and persistent policy uncertainty at the global level.

Despite these global challenges, the RBI report said the current state of the Indian economy provides grounds for optimism. The GDP

growth estimates for 2025-26 indicate that India will continue to remain the fastest-growing major economy in the world.

The report also highlighted India's efforts to diversify and strengthen exports in order to reduce risks related to the external sector. It said India is currently engaged in trade negotiations with 14 countries or groups, representing nearly 50 nations, including the European Union, Gulf Cooperation Council countries, and the United States.

In December, India concluded trade negotiations with New Zealand and Oman.

Additionally, the RBI noted that 2025 witnessed major economic reforms, including the rationalisation of tax structures, the implementation of labour codes for labour market reforms, and financial sector deregulation.

These measures, the report said, are expected to further strengthen India's growth prospects in the coming years.

Overall, the RBI report emphasised that India's resilient financial system, reform momentum, and balanced policy framework place the economy in a strong position despite ongoing global uncertainties.

In the third set, Maestrelli made a comeback after losing two breaks, but Djokovic then raised his level and secured the victory, setting up a third-round clash with Dutch player Botić van de Zandschulp.
