Ajit Pawar's plane crashes during landing, Deputy Chief Minister Pawar and 6 others killed

Maharashtra Deputy Chief Minister Ajit Pawar died in a plane crash that occurred on Wednesday morning in Baramati, Maharashtra. The accident happened during landing at Baramati airport. Pictures and videos from the accident site showed the aircraft completely damaged and burnt. A total of five people died in this accident. These include Ajit Pawar, his bodyguard Videep Jadhav, flight attendant Pinky Mali, pilot Captain Sumit Kapoor, and Captain Shambhavi Pathak. The Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) stated that the Learjet 45 (VT-SSK) aircraft crashed-landed at Baramati Airport this morning. There were five people on board the aircraft, including Maharashtra Deputy Chief Minister Ajit Pawar, two other people (a PSO and an attendant), and two crew members. According

to initial information, no one on board the aircraft survived the accident. It is being said that Ajit Pawar had four public meetings scheduled in Baramati on Wednesday in view of the Zilla Parishad elections. He had left Mumbai for Baramati to attend these programs. The plane crashed while it was in the process of landing in Baramati. The aircraft in which Ajit Pawar was traveling was a Bombardier Learjet-45. According to eyewitnesses, the plane was first seen descending, then suddenly became uncontrollable and crashed into the ground, followed by a loud explosion. Maharashtra Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis, while speaking to the media, said that he was deeply saddened by the news of the death of a grassroots leader, my friend and colleague, Maharashtra Deputy Chief Minister Ajit Pawar, in a plane crash. 
Supreme Court takes a tough stance on acid attacks, says government should amend laws for stricter punishment and property confiscation

New Delhi: Expressing deep concern over the increasing incidents of acid attacks in the country, the Supreme Court has strongly advocated for extraordinary punitive measures against the perpetrators. The apex court on Tuesday clearly suggested to the central government that it seriously consider amending the law to prevent heinous crimes like acid attacks. The court believes that these cases should be dealt with as strictly as dowry death cases, where the burden of proving innocence rests with the accused. A bench of Chief Justice Surya Kant, Justice R Mahadevan, and Justice Joymalya Bagchi made these observations while hearing a public interest litigation. The court said that unless the punishment is painful for the accused, it will be difficult to curb such crimes in society. The bench emphatically stated that there should be no room for the concept of reformatory punishment in such crimes. The court questioned why the property of such criminals cannot be confiscated.

President's address clearly outlines India's development journey and future direction: Prime Minister



Amendments to Uniform Consent Guidelines Notified Under Air and Water Pollution Control Laws

The Central Government has made significant amendments to the uniform consent guidelines notified under the air and water pollution control laws. These changes aim to simplify the process of obtaining environmental clearances for industries, reduce delays, and strengthen environmental compliance. This amendment will bring uniformity to the process of granting, rejecting, or revoking Consent to Establish (CTE) and Consent to Operate (CTO) guidelines issued last year. These guidelines ensure uniformity, transparency, and accountability

also reduced the approval timeline for red category industries from 120 days to 90 days. In addition, environmental auditors registered under the Environmental Audit Rules, 2025, have also been permitted to conduct inspections and compliance verification. The Ministry stated that, providing relief to micro and small industries, the Consent to Establish will be deemed approved based on a self-certified application for units located in notified industrial areas. The revised guidelines now prioritize site-specific environmental assessments instead of strict standards such as minimum distance criteria.

Debate on Constitutional Validity of UGC's Equality Regulations, Supreme Court Agrees to Hear Plea

Rahul Diwan, mentioned the petition before Chief Justice of India (CJI) Surya Kant. Yadav urged the court to hear the matter urgently, arguing that the implementation of the regulations would lead to discrimination and that the issue required immediate judicial scrutiny. Responding to his request, Chief Justice Kant agreed to consider fixing an early date for the hearing and asked

the lawyers to rectify any defects in the petition so that the matter could be listed. Diwan's petition is one of at least three challenges to the 2026 regulations that have reached the Supreme Court. These regulations were notified by the UGC on January 13, replacing the 2012 framework. One of the other petitions has been filed by Mrityunjay Tiwari, a post-doctoral researcher at Banaras Hindu University in Uttar Pradesh. Another petition was filed on Tuesday morning by advocate Vineet Jindal. The court proceedings took place against the backdrop of a wider national debate on the new equality regulations notified by the UGC. These regulations mandate the establishment of Equal Opportunity Centres and Equality Committees in universities, colleges, and recognized institutions to address discrimination complaints and promote inclusion.

EUreka! India seals landmark trade deal

New Delhi, Agency: India and the European Union on Tuesday agreed to significantly deepen their strategic partnership, concluding the negotiations on the long-awaited Free Trade Agreement and signing the first-ever overarching Security and Defence Partnership pact at the 16th India-EU Summit in New Delhi.

The summit capped a high-profile state visit by European Council President Antonio Costa and European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen, who were chief guests at India's 77th Republic Day celebrations - the first time EU leaders have been accorded the honour. They were accompanied by a senior delegation, including EU foreign policy chief Kaja Kallas and Trade Commissioner Maros Sefcovic.

Modi, co-chairing the summit with Costa and von der Leyen, said the outcomes reflected the "maturity and ambition" of the India-EU ties, rooted in shared democratic values and a common commitment to a rules-based international order.

"...India has concluded the largest FTA in its history. It is a happy coincidence that on

the 27th day of the month, India is entering into this FTA with the 27-member states of the European Union," Modi said during a joint press conference. He said this historic agreement would facilitate easier access for our farmers and small enterprises to European markets, create new opportunities in manufacturing, and further strengthen

cooperation across our services sectors. The centrepiece of the summit was the successful conclusion of negotiations on the India-EU FTA, described by both sides as a historic milestone. The deal is expected to boost bilateral trade and investment, strengthen diversified supply chains and support sustainable and inclusive growth at a time of global economic uncertainty.

Alongside the FTA, the two sides signed an India-EU Security and Defence Partnership pact, their first comprehensive framework covering cooperation in maritime security, defence industry and technology, cyber and hybrid threats, space and counter-terrorism. Negotiations were also launched on the Security of Information Agreement to facilitate the exchange of classified information.

Nipah under control in Bengal, says Centre as Thailand, Nepal step up screening

NEW DELHI, Agency: The Union health ministry on Tuesday clarified that the Nipah virus situation in West Bengal is under control, with only two confirmed cases reported since December last year, even as Thailand and Nepal tightened health screening of passengers arriving from India as a precautionary measure. The Ministry of Health and Family Welfare said reports from the National Centre for Disease Control (NCDC) show no additional Nipah Virus Disease cases beyond the two confirmed infections.

Despite the limited case count, neighbouring countries have moved to heighten vigilance. Thailand has begun screening passengers at three international airports receiving flights from West Bengal, while Nepal has initiated checks at Kathmandu airport and major land border points with India.



Nipah virus is a rare but highly fatal zoonotic infection that spreads from animals to humans and through close human contact. Naturally harboured by fruit bats (flying foxes), the virus can cause symptoms ranging from fever and respiratory illness to acute encephalitis, with a case fatality rate of 40-75%. There is no specific antiviral treatment or licensed vaccine, making early detection and strict infection control critical. The World Health Organization classifies Nipah as a priority pathogen due to its epidemic potential.

A century in uniform: Chandigarh girl carries 4 generations of Army service to Kartavya Path

A fourth-generation Army officer from Chandigarh, carrying a family legacy that stretches from the cavalry of the British Indian Army to post-Independence gallantry and modern-day integrated warfare, was among the commanding faces of this year's Republic Day parade. Captain Samira Zeenat Buttar, from Chandigarh's Sector 36 led the Integrated Operational Centre tableau themed on Operation Sindoos on Kartavya Path, a role that brought together her recent commissioning, a rare multi-decorated military lineage, and a contemporary operational showcase at the national ceremony.

Commissioned into the

Indian Army in 2021, Captain Buttar represents a rare continuity of service across four generations. Her great-grandfather served with the 4th Hodson's Horse in the British Indian Army. Her grandfather, Brigadier Sampuran Singh, then a Lieutenant Colonel, earned

the uncommon distinction of being awarded both the Mahavir Chakra and the Vir Chakra for his role in the 1965 Indo-Pak war. He later raised the 19 Punjab Regiment and remained in service until he passed away in 1971 due to battle casualties sustained during the 1965 conflict.

The lineage continued with her father, Sarbjit Singh, an officer of the 18 Mechanised Infantry. Captain Buttar is the only child in the family and the fourth successive generation to wear the uniform.

She credits her early grounding in discipline to her schooling. "As a boarding school student, I knew no other way of life than discipline," Captain Buttar said. "Routine, structure and accountability were part of everyday life, and that shaped how I approached responsibility."

At the Republic Day parade, Captain Buttar led the Integrated Operational Centre tableau, which depicted coordinated planning and operational control.



Why 2026 could be India's private space take-off year

BENGALURU, Agency: India was to ring in its 2026 space calendar with a launch that quietly captured the direction the sector is now taking. The PSLV-C62, carrying a clear private sector imprint, however, failed on Jan 12. Notwithstanding that setback, 2026 is still shaping up as the year when India's private sector can show results in orbit.

Just eight days after the PSLV mission, the country's first Earth Observation Satellite System (EOSS) under PPP saw a key milestone with the signing of a concession agreement that allows the winning consortium to finally begin work on ground, four months after it won the project from the Indian National Space Promotion and Authorisation Centre (IN-SPACE)

The agreement was between IN-SPACE and Allied Orbits - the special purpose vehicle (SPV) created by the consortium of Pixxel Space, Piersight Space, SatSure Analytics India, and Dhruva Space - at the former's office in Bengaluru.

TOI reported earlier in Aug 2025



that the Pixxel-led consortium had won the project through a "zero-bid". While the concession agreement was to be signed within three months, delay in processes saw it signed on Jan 20.

The project will create a constellation of 12 satellites, data from which will be used for applications ranging from climate change monitoring and disaster response to agriculture, infrastructure planning, maritime operations, and national security, where there are huge gaps so far as having eyes in the sky is concerned.

The consortium will implement the

project through Allied Orbits. "As part of the project, PierSight will build synthetic aperture radar (SAR) satellites, Pixxel will build hyperspectral & high resolution optical satellite, SatSure will make multispectral satellites and Dhruva will develop ground stations," Gaurav Seth, Piersight CEO and co-founder told TOI.

Pixxel CEO Awais Ahmed told TOI that their firm was "implementing 60% of the project and investing the same amount to boot."

"Of the 12 satellites, seven will come from Pixxel, three from SatSure and two from PierSight," Awais said, adding that Pixxel will build two types of satellites: Five of them will be ultra high-res submeter satellite and two will be hyperspectral satellites.

Over the next four to five years, the consortium is expected to invest more than Rs 1,200 crore to create the 12-satellite constellation in low-Earth orbit. The project is designed to enhance India's data sovereignty and reduce dependence on foreign imagery.

Wet spell in north-west India to continue till Feb 2



NEW DELHI, Agency: An active western disturbance is prevailing over the region and a fresh western disturbance is expected from the night of January 30, which are likely to bring in light to moderate rainfall and snowfall at many places likely over the Western Himalayan region and the adjoining plains of north-west India till February 2.

Fairly widespread rain is expected at many places in Haryana and Punjab on January 28 and February 1, while on other

days, only a few places in these states may receive rain, according to the India Meteorological Department. Moderate rains were experienced at many places on January 27. Over the past 24 hours, light to moderate rain was experienced at some places in Punjab. These included Gurdaspur, Amritsar, Tarn Taran and Kapurthala districts to the north and Barnala, Sangrur and Mansa districts in the south. In Haryana, only Jind and Mahendergarh districts received rain.

Centre turns down Opposition's demand to restore MGNREGA

NEW DELHI, Agency: The government on Tuesday rejected the Opposition's demands for the restoration of the Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Act (MGNREGA) and discussion on the ongoing special intensive revision (SIR) of electoral rolls during the Budget session of Parliament.

At an all-party meeting held ahead of the session, Opposition parties demanded structured discussions on a range of issues, including the restoration of the UPA-era MGNREGA, the SIR and the alleged vote theft.

The government, however,



refused to accede to the Opposition's demands, making it clear that the Viksit Bharat-Guarantee for Rozgar and Ajeevika Mission

(Gramin), which replaced MGNREGA, would not be rolled back, as it could not apply a "reverse gear" on a legislation cleared by

Parliament.:

According to sources, the government indicated in the meeting that the Budget was the primary agenda of the upcoming session and members were free to raise other issues during the discussion on the motion of thanks on the President's address to both Houses of Parliament.

President Droupadi Murmu will address both the Houses of Parliament on Wednesday, the first day of the Budget session. On January 29, the economic survey will be released, while Parliament will not function on January 30. The Budget will be presented by Finance

Minister Nirmala Sitharaman on February 1. On February 2 and 3, the discussion on the motion of thanks will take place, while the Budget will be discussed on February 4 and 5. The first half of the Budget session will be from January 28 to February 13, while the second phase will take place from March 9 to April 2. There will be 30 sittings during the session.

The all-party meeting, chaired by Defence Minister Rajnath Singh, was attended by several senior ministers, including Parliamentary Affairs Minister Kiren Rijiju, along with floor leaders of various political parties from

both the Lok Sabha and the Rajya Sabha.

Later, speaking to the media, Rijiju said as per parliamentary rules, discussions during the Budget session should primarily revolve around the Budget.

"Many members raised several issues during the meeting. We have noted them. We have informed members that various issues can be raised during the debate on the motion of thanks to the President's address and also during the Budget discussions. Since this is a Budget session, the main focus will remain on the Budget," he said.

Last year, the government provided significant relief to the common people by exempting incomes up to ₹12 lakh from tax, and this time expectations are even higher. On the government's advice, the Honorable President has summoned both houses of Parliament for the Budget Session. This session will begin on January 28th and continue until April 2nd. The session will be held in two parts: the first from January 28th to February 13th, and the second from March 9th to April 2nd. In addition to the budget, several important discussions and the passage of several significant bills are expected during this period. She holds the record for presenting more budgets than other prominent figures. In previous budgets, she has taken numerous steps to strengthen the economy. Will this budget



also play a significant role in shaping the country's economic direction this time? The country's economic situation is expected to pick up momentum in 2026-27. The Union Budget for the fiscal year 2026-27 is expected to continue its emphasis on capital expenditure, fiscal discipline, and reforms that support economic growth. Job creation and skill development are likely to be given top priority in the upcoming Union Budget. The government's goal will be to create more employment opportunities for youth and strengthen skill training. The budget is also expected to take significant steps to reduce regulations and further improve ease of doing business. Gross tax revenue is projected to grow at a rate of 9.6% in fiscal year 2027. This growth is roughly in line with the projected nominal GDP growth of 10.1%, but will be lower than previous averages. Pressure on indirect taxes is likely to persist. Nevertheless, increased excise duty rates on tobacco products, effective February 2026, are expected to provide some support to excise

duty collections. On the non-tax revenue front, higher dividends from the Reserve Bank of India have provided significant relief to the government in fiscal year 2026. Non-tax revenue is expected to exceed budget estimates in the current fiscal year. However, the dividend from the RBI is projected to decline to ₹2-2.5 lakh crore in FY2027, from ₹2.7 lakh crore in FY2026. Capital expenditure remains a key pillar of the central government's growth strategy. After registering a robust 28.2% growth in the first eight months of FY2026, capital expenditure is projected to increase by 10% to ₹12.3 lakh crore in FY2027. Expenditure quality is also expected to remain strong, with the ratio of capital expenditure to revenue expenditure projected to be around 0.3 in both FY2026 and 2027. However, revenue expenditure growth has been sluggish so far in FY2026, partly due to expenditure rationalization measures. It is estimated that revenue expenditure may be cut by approximately ₹1.7 lakh crore in FY2026, which will help contain the fiscal deficit.

Ironically, the number of high-level international studies centers in Himachal Pradesh is limited, and even these centers are not sufficiently developing the ideological and diplomatic thinking that would be helpful in policymaking in accordance with the changing global geopolitical landscape. However, it is an undeniable truth that global geopolitical events directly impact not just countries but also their states. In the context of a small, mountainous state like Himachal Pradesh, there is a prevalent perception that its youth are confined to their villages, streets, or towns. The primary reason behind this is that the state lacks a strong ideological or academic institution dedicated to high-level study and research in political science and international relations. Although Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla, and Himachal Pradesh Central University, Dharamshala, have departments of political science, they have yet to produce

notable researchers or analysts in the field of international politics and global diplomacy. Currently, the Himachal Pradesh government, with the slogan of "system change," is establishing several new educational, economic, and administrative dimensions in the state, which are important steps towards realizing the vision of a self-reliant Himachal. Establishing a new high-level Department of Political Science and International Relations at Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel University, Mandi, could prove extremely beneficial not only for the state but also for the nation. By placing a special emphasis on the study of soft power, this center could work to understand the cultural, social, and ideological capabilities of Himachal Pradesh and India and elevate them to the policy-making level. While hard power is primarily based on economic and military resources, in this era of information technology, nations and states can also exert their effective presence through soft power. The concept of an independent and strong nation is possible only through the balanced use of hard power and soft power, which is now called "smart power." This is essential for maintaining one's dominance at the national and international levels and protecting the paramount interests of the people. If we consider the study of soft power in the context of Himachal Pradesh, the state's rich civilization, culture, traditions, and unique geographical location can establish its identity globally. Unfortunately, no institution in the state has yet been successful in conducting concrete research on Himachal's soft power and presenting authentic data to the government. No comprehensive and systematic study has been conducted in this area. The need of the hour is to provide Himachal Pradesh's soft power with a national and international platform. Furthermore, Himachal Pradesh shares international borders with China and Tibet through the Kinnaur and Lahaul-Spiti districts. India's relations with these regions have often been sensitive. While Himachal Pradesh relies on the central government for strategic policymaking, it must also develop its own clear policy and ideological perspective to provide the central government with realistic, ground-level information. No other state understands these border areas as closely as Himachal, yet the state lacks high-level researchers and a recognized institution to do so. History bears witness that Himachal Pradesh has been an important "corridor" for trade and cultural interaction between Central Asia and Tibet since ancient times. Despite the rugged Himalayan geography, Kullu, Shimla, and Kinnaur remained connected to the Silk Road network via the Hindustan-Tibet Route (Shipki La) and the Leh-Manali Route (Baralacha La). These routes not only facilitated the trade of pashmina, silk, and spices, but also facilitated the widespread dissemination of Buddhism and art. Even today, passes like Shipki La retain their historical significance for border trade and strategic purposes.

India's textiles exports to EU can quickly grow from USD 7 billion to USD 30-40 billion due to FTA: Piyush Goyal

New Delhi, Agency: Indian textile industry is set to benefit from the India-EU FTA with exports and has potential to grow from USD 7 billion to USD 30-40 billion very quickly, Union Minister of Commerce and Industry Piyush Goyal said on Tuesday, noting that this could generate 6-7 million jobs in the labour-intensive sector.

Goyal, who addressed a joint press conference here after India-EU FTA was finalized, said the two sides agreeing to key initiatives across domains is a statement of deep partnership and the strategic intent.

He referred to queries about Bangladesh having a huge lead over India in terms of garment exports to EU and said the neighbouring coun-

try, has zero duty access being a least developed country (LDC), and was able to capture USD 30 billion out of the USD 250 billion textiles market of the European Union.

He indicated that once the FTA comes into force, India will be on par with Bangladesh in terms of duties.

"First of all, in terms of job creation, most of us here are aware that the textile industry in India is the second largest job creator after agriculture, with nearly 40 million jobs being created in the textile sector. India exports about USD 7 billion worth of textiles and garments to the EU every year, and the duty rates are anywhere up to 12% on the goods that we export to the EU," he said.

"...the press used to always ask us, why is Bangladesh able to export



USD 30 billion worth of textiles, and India is such a small player? Because Bangladesh, being a least developed country, LDC, had zero duty access, and they were able to capture 30 bil-

lion out of the 250 billion dollar market of the European Union in textiles alone.

Now, we see before our eyes a potential to grow from 7 billion to at least 30-40 billion very quickly. If we add this kind of business only in the textile sector alone, we are looking at close to 6-7 million jobs coming into that sector.

So it has tremendous potential. The sectoral gains in various areas, particularly in the labour-intensive areas, give us tremendous potential for job creation in India," he added.

Piyush Goyal highlighted the unprecedented access Indian goods will have once the FTA is implemented.

"This agreement covers almost 99 per cent of the total exports that

are sent from India to the European Union and about 97 per cent plus of the total exports from EU to India," Goyal stated.

He noted that while India's current footprint in the European market is modest--accounting for roughly 1.5 per cent of goods imports and 2.5 per cent of services imports--the new deal provides a launchpad for exponential growth.

Goyal emphasised that areas with "very serious labour interest," such as textiles, apparels, home decor, and furnishing, will receive "duty free access from day one." While the agreement slashes tariffs, both sides are also addressing modern regulatory challenges, specifically the EU's Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism (CBAM).

Potential for India to emerge as global hub for chemicals manufacturing: Piyush Goyal

New Delhi, Agency: The finalisation of the India-European Union Free Trade Agreement (FTA) is expected to transform India into a global manufacturing hub for the chemicals sector, according to Union Minister of Commerce and Industry Piyush Goyal. The Minister highlighted that the strategic trade pact will unlock significant opportunities for domestic production and international supply chain integration.

Aiming self-reliance in 75% tech categories within 4 yrs: Vaishnav

New Delhi, Agency: The government is aiming to make high-tech small chips of 3-nanometre nodes -- used in products like modern smartphones and computers -- by 2032, Union minister Ashwini Vaishnav said on Tuesday.

The minister said the government will focus on six categories of chips -- compute, radio frequency (RF), networking, power, sensor, and memory -- under the second phase of Design-Linked Incentive Scheme that will allow compmediaes in the country to have major control on developing 70-75 per cent technology products.

"The level of 2032 is to reach 3-nanometer chips manufacturing and design. Design, of course, we are doing even today. But manufacturing we should reach 3 nanometer," the minister said,



after meeting with 24 chip design firms that have been selected under the Design-Linked Incentive Scheme.

The minister said the government now intends to scale up the programme, with a target of enabling at least 50 fabless semiconductor compmediaes in the country in the next phase.

The DLI Scheme aims to accelerate domestic chip design capabilities by supporting startups and compmediaes across categories.



Beyond the boundary: Bangladesh's withdrawal and the price of defiance:

New Delhi, Agency: When principle collided with power, and a nation's cricket paid the cost.

There are moments in cricket when the scorecard becomes irrelevant, when the contest is no longer between bat and ball but between principle and power.

Bangladesh's decision to withdraw from the forthcoming World Cup is one such moment - a decision shaped

The story did not begin with a fixture list or a security advisory. It began quietly, with the removal of Mustafizur Rahman from the Kolkata Knight Riders squad. Official explanations were sparse, wrapped in familiar administrative language that concealed more than it clarified. In Dhaka, the decision was not interpreted as routine. It was seen as political, punitive, and symbolic. And in cricket, symbolism carries weight long after press statements have faded.

The Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) responded not with diplomacy, but with defiance. It announced that their team would not play World Cup matches in India, citing concerns over player safety. Perhaps those concerns were genuinely held; perhaps they were also a shield for protest. The truth may lie somewhere in between. But the larger reality was clear: cricket had once again been drawn into a con-



flict not of its making. Pakistan soon aligned itself with Bangladesh's stance, offering support that was as political as it was fraternal. The issue was placed before the ICC board - that modern chamber where ideals often sit uncomfortably beside interests. When the vote was taken, only two boards supported Bangladesh's request for accommodation. The message was unambiguous: conform to the tournament structure, or withdraw. The BCB chose withdrawal.

The consequences of that choice will not be symbolic. They will be tangible and lasting. Financial loss will follow. Influence within ICC

corridors will diminish. Future tour negotiations will occur with reduced leverage. In the contemporary cricket economy, moral victories do not pay broadcast rights, and isolation carries a heavy cost.

There is an uncomfortable truth that must be acknowledged without evasion. India today is the financial heartbeat of world cricket. Its market sustains the game's prosperity; its commercial gravity shapes global decision-making. With financial power comes influence, and with influence comes compliance. Boards often align not out of conviction, but necessity. It is neither noble nor ignoble. It is simply the ecosystem in which modern cricket exists.

In such an environment, smaller boards must calculate with care. The BCB, in allowing emotion to override pragmatism, may have exposed its own cricketers to the harshest outcome. It is the player, not the administrator, who loses the World Cup stage. It is the supporter, not the politician, who loses the joy.

There is, too, a quiet historical irony in this episode. Asian cricket was once peripheral to power. Decisions were shaped in London and Melbourne with scant regard for voices from Karachi, Colombo, or Kolkata. Tours were dictated, influence rationed, and respect unevenly distributed.

Asian teams were often treated as guests in a game they played with equal passion.

That era has passed. The axis of power has shifted. The financial centre of gravity has moved eastward. The circle has turned full. Those once excluded sit at the centre of authority; those once dominant must now negotiate. But power, wherever it resides, rarely behaves gently.

The sadness here is not that Bangladesh chose to take a stand. Institutions must, at times, defend their dignity. The sadness lies in the absence of foresight. Courage, when unaccompanied by strategy, can become self-inflicted damage.

One cannot help but think


of the Bangladeshi cricketer - the young batter practicing late into the evening in Mirpur, dreaming of a World Cup hundred; the fast bowler pushing through exhaustion with hopes of hearing his anthem on the grandest stage. Those dreams do not belong to boardrooms. They belong to the field. And it is on that field that the loss will be most keenly felt.

Cricket has always claimed a higher calling. It speaks of spirit, honour, and the idea that the game is greater than any one player or nation. Yet it is also shaped by economics, influence, and governance. These realities coexist uneasily, colliding most visibly in moments such as this.

Bangladesh's absence will be recorded in administrative minutes and debated endlessly across studios and columns. But its deeper meaning lies elsewhere. It stands as a reminder that in modern cricket, principle must walk alongside pragmatism; and that protest without preparation can cost a generation its opportunity.

History will decide whether the BCB acted with courage or miscalculation. For now, the silence created by their absence will speak loudly enough.

And the game, as it always does, will move on - perhaps diminished, certainly reflective, but enduring.

For us bowlers, we need to keep it simple. When you overcomplicate it, it does not work. Our two left-arm spinners did that really well today. You need to stay consistent," Devine said.
